

In 2001 the ground was rotated 90 degree to use the old part of the Kings Park Ground with three stands going up in months the old goals are under the main stand and its opposite number

Away fans are located on one side of the Energy Consulting East Stand, which is situated at one side of the pitch. The normal allocation for this area is 1,500 seats, but this can be increased to 2,000 if required. The stand is shared with home supporters and offers a good view of the playing action. The facilities are okay a normally there has a good atmosphere.



Ted McDougal Stand

Food on offer inside the ground includes a range of Pies; Steak and Ale, Chicken & Mushroom Chicken Balti (all £3), Burger/Cheeseburgers (£3.50), and Hot Dogs (£3.50) and there are good portions. If you turn right out of the railway station and walk past the roundabout can I recommend the Dorset Bakery as their pies are cheaper than in the stadium?



Steve Fletcher Stand

Four hundred yards from Pokesdown Station on Christchurch Road is the Sir Percy Florence Shelley pub where you get a nice pint and food don't wear any colours neutral or away.

Driving to the Ground



Follow the North and North East take the A1 or M6 to Birmingham and then join the M40 at Junction 3A then at junction 9, take the A41/A34 exit to Bicester/ Aylesbury/ Oxford/ Newbury and at the roundabout, take the third exit onto A34 and follow it to Winchester.

Just before Winchester merge onto the M3 and follow it to Southampton then at junction 13, exit toward Southampton Docks/ Bournemouth and join the M27 and the go straight onto the A31 till you get to just after Ringwood take the A338 exit to Bournemouth/ Christchurch/ Bournemouth International Airport and at the roundabout take the first exit onto the A338 towards Bournemouth.



Main Stand

The ground is situated on the left of the A338 in the outskirts of town. Leave the A338 via the slip road which is (Signposted Boscombe/ A3049 Kings Park/ Football traffic). You will then reach a small roundabout at which you take the second exit onto Kings Park Drive. The entrance to the stadium and car park is 200 yards down this road on the left. The car park at the ground is of a good size, however please note that this costs 50p per hour and they like to hand out tickets!!!

Public Transport



From the North take the train to **Pokesdown Railway Station** which is roughly a 15-minute walk away. Then exit the main entrance my way is to go left then left again down Clarence Road and walk across the park past the sports centre or you can turn right down the main Christchurch Road, after 200 yards and then turn right into Gloucester Road. Dean Court is located down the bottom of this road or **More Bus U3** across from the railway station and get off at the Queens Hotel.



Take the train to **Bournemouth Central Railway Station**, then walk down to Stop 6 and take the **More Bus U3** to the Queens Park Hotel turn right then take the second right into Kings Park Drive and walk straight on the ground is in front of you.

Ground Guide

Arsenal moved the short distance down the road to the Emirates Stadium in 2006, after having played for 93 years at one of the most historic grounds in the country; Arsenal Stadium (better known as Highbury).

The Emirates is a modern "bowl" which means each stand has the same number of tiers and is continuous around the pitch. The four sections have inherited the names of the stands at Highbury: The North Bank, East Stand, The Clock End (South) and the West Stand which houses the club's main facilities.

The ground has a capacity of over 60,000 the stadium and is the only stadium that I know of, in this country that is four tiers all round. The lower tier is set well back from the playing surface as a cinder track surrounds the playing area. A small second tier, which is called the Club tier, has seating, but is only eight rows high. Inside it has a number of lounges/restaurants.



South, West and East Stands

The club made a replica of the old clock that stood and Highbury and put it on the South Stand end just like the old days at Highbury Stadium. The third tier is even smaller, being entirely comprised of executive boxes, some 150 in total and fits entirely under the large fourth tier. This fourth tier, known as the upper tier, has been designed in a semi-circular fashion and is topped by a clear Perspex roof. Two large video screens situated in the North West & South East corners, below the roof line, complete the stadium.



West, North and East Stands

Up to 3,000 visiting supporters can be accommodated and they're housed in the lower tier of the south east corner of the stadium. Cup matches will see bigger allocations given, if required. The tickets, and food/drink within the ground, are pricey, with entrance to the stadium is by a 'smart ticket', whereby rather than giving your ticket to a turnstile operator.

On a separate note, then if you like your pies and you have alighted at Finsbury Park Station then on Gillespie Road also not far from Arsenal Tube Station going towards the Emirates, is a stall called Piebury Corner which is frequented by home and away supporters as the pies are good and cheaper than on the concourse inside the stadium with the Drayton Arms, which is located near to Arsenal tube station and Drayton Park railway station. This Courage pub overlooks the new stadium and is only a few minutes' walk away,

The Blackstock which also welcomes neutrals and away fans, plus it has a big screen showing Sky Sports' is at 284 Seven Sisters Road two minutes away from Manor House Tube station.

There is also the White Lion of Mortimer, which are a five-minute walk away from Finsbury Park Tube Station along 125 Stroud Green Road and a short walk to the ground and the Twelve Pins (formerly the Finsbury Park Tavern) near Finsbury Park Tube Station and this is ten minutes from the ground.

Driving to the Ground



Travel down the M6 then onto the M1 and park at Watford Junction or Luton Parkway Railway Station don't use Cockfosters as this is used by everybody as it's an easy way to get to the ground.

From the South take the M4 to Heathrow Airport or M23 and Park at Gatwick Airport and take the tube in to the ground. From them it's a 6-zone day card which will cost you £8.60 from Heathrow, Luton and Watford Junction using a Visitors Oyster Card which you top up when you need it or visit Traveline and get a train ticket plus a zone transport card for the day its cheaper that getting a train and underground ticket.

Public Transport







→ 5 mins

Take the Piccadilly Line and you should get off at the **Arsenal Underground Station**. It is only a few minutes' walk from here to the stadium and on exiting the station, you then turn right and follows Drayton Park Road around to the left and then walk over the bridge over the railway line to the stadium.





 \rightarrow 6 mins

Alternative is to take the underground or Overground to **Highbury & Islington Railway Station/Underground Station**, from the train station turn right and walk straight up to the Holloway Road and at the crossroads with the Metro Café on the left take a right and the ground will be in front of you when you get to the roundabout. You can wait a few minutes at take the train to **Drayton Park Railway Station** which is two minutes from the ground

Ground Guide

The stadium has been completely rebuilt since the late 1970's, with the four stands each have their own design. At one end is the Holte End and is used by the home fan which is a large two-tiered structure which replaced one of the largest covered terraces in the country. This was opened in the 1994/95 season it has a capacity of 13,500 seated supporters. At the other end is the North Stand, which is older, but still modern looking. This is two tiered, with a double row of executive boxes running across the middle.

On one side of the pitch is the Doug Ellis Stand, which again is two-tiered and is roughly the same height as the other two stands. This stand was opened prior to the 1996 European Championships. Opposite is the latest edition, the impressive looking Trinity Road Stand which was opened in 2001 it is three tiered, with a small tier at the front and then two larger tiers above, which are separated by a row of executive boxes. There are also two large video screens installed in opposite corners of the ground.



Holt End

There is unusual feature is that between the Trinity Road & Holte End Stands is a pavilion type structure that was built at the same time as the Trinity Road. This three-tiered building is used for corporate hospitality. On the other side of the Holte End is another similar looking structure that is used by the Police.

Away supporters are located on one side of the Doug Ellis Stand, towards the North end of the stadium. Up to 2,972 fans can be accommodated in this area, split between both the upper and lower tiers of the stand. For smaller clubs then the upper tier is allocated to the club.

The concourse at the back of the upper tier is tight and easily becomes crowded, but there is more space behind the lower section. There is a fair selection of food available in the lower tier, where there are a selection of Pukka Pies and Pasties (all £3.30), Rollover Hot Dogs (£2.60) and then additionally in the lower tier; Cheeseburgers (£3.50), Fish & Chips (£6.50) and Chips (£2.80). But buy the food from the Pound Bakery at Birmingham New Street Station excellent pies and a lot cheaper.



North End

Driving to the Ground



Take the M6; leave the M6 at Junction 6 and take the slip road sign posted Birmingham (NE). Turn right at the roundabout (the fourth exit), the ground is well signposted from here. But turn right at the second set of traffic lights (At the King Edward VII pub) on to Aston Hall Road. This road will take you down to the ground. Mostly street parking although this is not as plentiful as it once was due to a local resident only parking scheme now in place in the streets around the Witton roundabout area. In-between the Witton Arms and Witton Station there is a small pay and display car park which cost only £1.60 for six hours.

Train to the following stations the first is **Witton Railway Station** is nearer and is only a few minutes' walk from the ground. Turn left out of the station exit and continue down Manor Road to a roundabout. Turn left at the roundabout into Witton Lane and the ground is in front of you.



Doug Ellis Stand

Aston Railway Station is a ten minutes' walk away from the ground walk down Lichfield Road at the first right turn into Queen's Road and follows it down to the ground although it changes to Witton Lane nearer the ground. Ground Guide

The new ground is similar to the old Griffin Park but has a 17,250 capacity. The main Stand is the South Stand (nearest to Kew Bridge Station) and holds around 4,654 on the North Stand and which includes a Family area has a capacity of just under 4,500.

Away fans are housed in the East Stand and North Stands for the away support is bigger than 2,500 and the East Stand has a capacity of 4,000 and along with the West Stand for home supporters. There is no parking at the stadium but 1.000+ spaces are made available in the local area, managed by an outsourced company and the stadium is directly attached to Kew Bridge Railway Station London bound platform but if this gets busy then use the local route.

There are number of pubs in the area The Express, One Over the Bridge at Kew Bridge, The City Barge Pub and The Bell and Crown and Steam Packet on Thames Road or cross Kew Bridge for the Greyhound on Kew Green and a number of others across Kew Bridge or you can drink at the ground as they are a selection of London Pride and Guinness on tap.

The grub inside the ground includes a good selection of refreshments on offer and should be the same prices Pies (£3.50), Pasties (£3), Jumbo Hot Dogs (£4), Cheeseburgers (£3.70), Burgers (£3.60) and Sausage Rolls (£2.20) with the alternative is to go Sainsbury which is opposite the Kew Bridge Railway Station

Driving to the Ground & Public Transport



There is no parking available at the stadium, so fans are advised not to drive to the ground.

Pre-booked car parking will be available via the Club's website ahead of games and directions to those car parks will then be provided.



Main Stand and East End

From the North/West

Exit the M1 at junction 1 and use the left lanes and at the roundabout take the second exit onto the North Circular Road and at Gunnersbury Cemetery Roundabout take the fifth exit (following the signs for M4) onto the Great West Road and at the Novetel Hotel roundabout take the first exit and after crossing the railway bridge turn left into Bunford Road and then take a left after the steam museum into Chiswick High Street and then first left for the ground.

From the East/South

Exit the M4 then Exit onto Great West Rd/A4 towards A205/A315/Chiswick/N & S Circular/A406/Kew Gardens on to Great West Road take the sixth exit (following the signs for M4) onto the Great West Road and at the Novetel Hotel roundabout take the first exit and after crossing the railway bridge turn left into Bunford Road and then take a left after the steam museum into Chiswick High Street and then first left for the ground.



South and West Stand

Because of the restrictions on car parking it is best to do the following:

West

Park at Slough Railway Station then train to Ealing Broadway Rail Station and then from outside take the **65 London Bus** to Kew Bridge Rail Station

North and North West

Park at Watford Junction then take the London Overground to Willesden Junction Rail Station and then take the District underground to Gunnersbury Underground Station.

North East

Park at Luton Parkway Railway Station and take the Thameslink to London St Pancras then Piccadilly Line to Hammersmith and then change to the District Line to Gunnersbury Underground Station.

East

Park at Stanstead Airport then take the train to Tottenham Hale Railway Station and then take the underground to Green Park and then take the Piccadilly Line to Hammersmith and then change to the District Line to Gunnersbury Underground Station.





 \rightarrow 6 mins

The stadium is only 100 yards from **Kew Bridge Railway Station** from south Western Trains the stadium is directly attached to Kew Bridge station London bound platform but if this gets busy then use the local route, then turn first left and the ground is in front of you.

Take the underground to **Gunnersbury Underground Station**, which is approximately 10 minutes' walk from the stadium. From the station, walk towards Chiswick roundabout, cross over the roundabout using the crossings and walk along Chiswick High Road – the stadium is on your right. The Alternative is taking the **London Transport 65**, **239**, **267** and **39** bus down to Brentford Fountain Leisure Centre Stop W cross the road there and walk up to the railway station but take a right before the station and the ground is 400 yards in front of you.

From a far the semi-circular roofs of the stand and the tubular supporting steelwork above them, are at first glance reminiscent of the Galpharm Stadium in Huddersfield and the KC Stadium in Hull.



South Stand

But the similarity ends as this is a far superior ground, which inside is reminiscent of the KC Stadium in Hull. On one side is the impressive looking West Stand. This three-tiered stand, has a large lower tier, a small middle tier and a medium sized upper tier. The seating in the upper tier follows the semi-circular design of the stand, giving it an interesting effect. The team dugouts are located on this side, as well as an open press area, which is conveniently situated

above the player's tunnel on the half way line.

Opposite is the smaller East Stand. This two-tiered stand had its upper tier added in the Summer of 2012 and the gap in-between the two tiers is occupied by the Clubs' administrative offices.

Both ends are also small single tiers of seating, and have an electric scoreboard to the rear. One of these ends, the South Stand, has a hospitality area containing a number of executive boxes, which is situated above the seated area. The roofs over both ends slope down from the larger West Stand on one side to the East Stand opposite, giving the ground a different look.



North Stand

Both ends are also small single tiers of seating, and have an electric scoreboard to the rear. One of these ends, the South Stand, has a hospitality area containing a number of executive boxes, which is situated above the seated area. The roofs over both ends slope down from the larger West Stand on one side to the East Stand opposite, giving the ground a different look.

One nice touch though, is rather than having lettering displayed on the seating, images of seagulls are included instead. What the makes the ground particularly striking is the amount of transparent material used in the roofs of the stadium.

Fans who visit The Amex to watch their team away fans will be housed in the south east corner of the stadium where approximately 3,300 fans can be accommodated. The views from within these sections are fantastic and the leg room is ample as would be expected for a new build. One thing you may not expect but will find as a bonus is the padded seats! as standard and generous amounts of leg room for every supporter watching the match. The concourse is equally impressive with plenty of space and facilities on offer which reduces the feelings of being in a stampede when trying to use the toilet at half-time.

The grub inside the ground includes a good selection of refreshments on offer including Pies from Piglets Pantry in Shoreham-on-sea, which are baked on-site. You can choose from Steak & Harveys Ale with mushrooms, Chicken & Ham with leek and Vegetarian butternut squash with spicy tomato. However, it will cost you £4.20 for the privilege making them the most

expensive pies in the league. Also, on offer are Cheeseburgers (£4.70), Burgers (£4.60) and Hot Dogs (£4.20).



West Stand

Although the food in the ground is good I fall either into Baglemans Bakery at the Station or walk two minutes to Real Pastries in Trafalgar Street in Brighton cheaper than the food at the ground and the pies are land mines helps you get to the stadium from Brighton. Lastly, whether design or accident, The Amex has fantastic acoustics which makes the atmosphere on match days pretty electrifying for a ground.

The Evening Star, on Surrey Street and only two a minute walk away from Brighton Central main station or The Hikers Rest (BN1 9GD) which has sky sports and a lovely garden to sit out in with pre-match drink and is only approximately half a mile away. A little further afield is The Swan Inn (BN1 9PD) which is a more traditional pub. Also has Sky Sports on tv's around the pub but there's a very relaxed feeling about the place. I guess that may disappear once 1200 away fans set upon it on a Saturday afternoon though! A more popular option tends to be to head in to Brighton for pre-game drinks and simply use the free travel from your match ticket to get the train along closer to kick off.

Driving to the Ground





PR Shuttle

Take the M25 to Junction 7 and go onto the M23 at the end of the M23, and then continue onto the A23, heading towards Brighton. At the roundabout which is the junction with the A27, continue straight on and carry on down London Road to the fire Station then take a left into Viaduct Road and at the lights take a right into Ditching Road and then second left into Union Road then after 200 yards at the lights take a left onto the A270 Lewes Road. Then after few yards at the lights go up the hill into Elm Grove and then turn right and park at the racecourse then take the park and ride. Or for night games use the post code Mill Road (BN1 8ZF) there are lights there and you want need to take a torch unlike the racecourse where there are no lights.

The Park & Ride is open from 12 noon on Saturdays (with last departure at 2.30pm) and 6.30pm for evening kick offs. The last buses return from the stadium 90 minutes after the end of the game. The cost of the Park & Ride is included in the price of your match ticket. So just

show your match ticket or proof of ticket booking (if collecting your match tickets from the ticket office at the stadium). Please note that vehicles must remove no later than two hours after the game has ended.

Ground Guide

The club has played at Turf Moor since 1883, which is one of the longest continual occupations of ground by any club in the League. Half the ground was re-developed in the mid 1990's with two new stands being opened.

The first of these the James Hargreaves Stand was opened in early 1996. It has two large tiers, with a row of executive boxes, housed between them. Which replaced the Longside Terrace, which was a big steep covered terrace and a few months later by the Jimmy McIlroy Stand was opened at one end of the ground. This two-tiered stand is similar in design which gives half the ground a uniform look.



David Fishwick Stand

The Bob Lord Stand at one side of the pitch was opened in 1974. It is a small all seated single tiered stand, with a row of supporting pillars running across its middle and has windshields to either side. The Cricket Field Stand at one end of the ground was opened in 1969 and again it is single tiered stand that has some supporting pillars.

There is a Police Control Box situated in one corner of the stadium in-between the Bob Lord and Jimmy McIlroy Stands. Unusually the teams emerge from a tunnel from one end of the ground in the David Fishwick Stand.

The away fans are housed in the covered David Fishwick Stand (Ladbrokes Stand) at one end of the ground up to 2,100 away fans can be accommodated for league matches and can be found on the Bob Lord side of the stand. Views are unrestricted and facilities are very good with the club keeping the old turnstiles after the redevelopment.

The grub inside the ground includes has a number of refreshment outlets available which serve include; Hot Dogs (£2.70), plus a range of Holland's Pies; Big Potato and Meat (£3), Cheese & Onion (£3) and Peppered Steak (£3). Although the food in the ground is good I fall either Clarets Bakery at the ground or go to Oddies at 38 St James Street on the way to ground pies and cakes are of excellent quality



James Hargreaves Stand

The Cricket Club; 'the clubhouse is open on match days and visitors are always made welcome which is ideal as it is right next door to the ground. The beer and wine are cheap here as well as there is good food.

Driving to the Ground



Leave the M6 at Junction 29 and onto the M65 and then leave the M65 at Junction 10 and follow signs for Follow the A682 to the town-centre and take the first exit at the roundabout (by Gala bingo club) into Yorkshire Street. Continue through traffic lights into Brunshaw Road

for the ground which is on the left. There is a car park at the cricket ground before Turf Moor which costs £6 or otherwise street parking across from the cricket ground in Leyland Road.

Take the train to **Burnley Central Railway Station** then walk out the station across the road down Railway Street towards a small retail park and then turn left into Curzon Street. Continue down this road over the canal and you will reach Turf Moor on your left.

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Ground Guide

The ground is quite impressive looking, located on one side of the pitch it is a superb three-tiered affair having a row of executive boxes running across its middle. Its roof is virtually transparent, allowing more light to reach the pitch and gives it a unique look. The club had started development of the ground in 1973 with a three-tiered Stand replacing the old East Stand and North End Pavilion and after the Taylor report the club took eleven years to complete it.

Having started the final all seating of the ground in 1993 with the North End (Mathew Harding End), then the diehard Chelsea fans had to see their beloved Shed End go under the bulldozers to be replaced by a new south Stand in 1998.



East Stand today (BEG)

Approximately 3,000 seats are made available for visiting supporters and they are located in the south east corner of the Shed End. Away fans are separated between the upper and lower tiers of the shed for league games whilst for cup games, the whole lower tier is generally given over. If demand is low then a much smaller section of both upper and lower tiers is optional. There are no supporting pillars within the stadium which makes for fantastic views from all areas and leg room within the shed is ample. Refreshments are not overly expensive and facilities are what you'd expect from one of the biggest clubs in England.

The builders took advantage of the fact that the 'old' Stamford Bridge was oval shaped and had been a running, cycling as well as speedway track since it was first laid out in 1880 and have stretched the new stands right around the ground 'filling in' the corners, so that the stadium is totally enclosed. The latest addition to the stadium is the attractive looking West Stand, which was opened in 2001 and that finally erased the running track that had had been round the pitch since 1880.

The Dukes Head which is an away friendly pub at 8 Lower Richmond near **Putney Bridge Railway Station** come out of the station cross over the river and turn right the pub is two minutes away their good friendly atmosphere good food and a good selection of beer and a family run pub.

Lowcountry Bar formerly Zulu's is an away friendly pub located at 4 Fulham High Street and is on the way from Putney Rail Station which is on the District Line just on the High Street the pub is on the righthand side the menu includes a variety of steaks and seafood. Crawfish, steamed cracked crabs; and seafood gumbo, served with andouille sausage are some of the unique offerings and excellent selections of beers

From either of these walk up the Kings Road to the Imperial Arms take the first left up Holmead Road then at the end take a left cross the road and first right its 36 minutes' walk to the ground and these are better for the neutrals.

Driving to the Ground



If you are going to drive to the ground then it is better to park at Basingstoke Railway Station from the East or Watford Junction Railway Station from the North and Gatwick Airport in the South take the tube and railway in its easier to get to the game for a neutral fan and use the Oyster Visitor Card which is the cheapest way across London for games which you keep and top it up when you go to the games in London. See Public Transport for directions.



From the North, East or West

Use the M25 to take you round to junction 15 and turn off onto the M4 towards London, follow the M4 which becomes the A4 up to Hammersmith. Stay on it over the Hammersmith flyover and for a further 1.5 miles before turning off for Earls Court. Go past Earls Court station and down the one-way system until you hit Fulham Road, turn right at the traffic lights. Go straight on for 600 yards and the ground is on your right. Parking is difficult very close to the ground so you may want to look a bit further away by parking at London Olympia on Hammersmith Rd, London W14 8UX and it is £15 for up to four hours, take the underground to the ground.



From the South

Take the M25 to Junction 12 and merge onto the M3 follow the M3 to the end then follow onto the A316 through Richmond and 6 roundabouts till just before Hammersmith Cemetery on the left at the lights take a left into Lower Richmond Road and go on through three roundabouts and just after St Marys Church at the crossroads take a left into Castelnau/A306 and continue on over Hammersmith Bridge to cross the river. Follow the road under the A4 then turn right into Hammersmith Road then after 100 yards take a slight right into Butterwick at Loreol then at the lights take a left onto the A4 and follow it for a mile then at the lights before the metro Bank (on the right) take a right then at the Fulham Bar take a right onto Fulham Road then take second right after the Esso Station to the ground.

If you want to park your car then use Smugglers Way, London SW18 1DB car park there is usual a number of spaces and there is security walking around and it only a fifteen-minute walk to the ground or a short bus ride

Public Transports to the Ground







 \rightarrow 6 mins

Take the train to any of the main stations in London and then take the District Line and alight at **Fulham Broadway Underground Station** at the entrance turn left and then take the third on the left and follow it down to the ground.







 \rightarrow 12 mins

Take the London Overground to **West Brompton Railway Station** and it is around a 12 minute walk to the ground from West Brompton station so you turn right outside the station, then right again under the Arch into Brompton Cemetery and walk on through the Cemetery and Stamford Bridge is five minutes in front of you but If it is a night game then turn right after the cemetery into Finborough Road then past it then bear right into Ilford Road past the theatre and after a half-mile, turn right onto the Fulham Road the ground is on the left after 200 yards.

Ground Guide

The ground is a mixture of the modern and the old, with two old side stands and two more modern looking end stands. The main Stand was built when Palace moved into the ground in 1924 built under the guidance of Archibald Leitch by Humphreys of Kensington and the roof was replaced in 2013.



Main Stand

With the Main Stand have a number of ancient looking floodlights on its roof and the grounds capacity is now 26,300. The newest edition is the two-tiered Holmesdale Road Stand at one end, which was opened in 1995. This stand has a large lower tier, with a smaller upper tier that overhangs it. The stand looks impressive and has a large curved roof, as well as windshields on either side of the upper tier. This is where the bulk of home supporters congregate.



Holmesdale Road

Opposite is the Whitehorse Lane Stand. This was originally a very large open terrace but was reduced in capacity in the early 1980's when land was sold for a Sainsbury's supermarket which is still present outside the ground. During the early 1990's the terrace was made all seated and a double row of executive boxes was the constructed above it, giving it an unusual look. Later a roof added and then a large video screen installed upon it. This stand was renamed the 'Croydon Advertiser Family Stand.



Whitehorse Lane Stand

Opposite the main stand is the large, covered, single tiered Arthur Wait stand, which was built in 1969; the stand has a TV gantry suspended beneath its roof.

Away are still housed on one side of the Arthur Wait Stand however they have been relocated to the opposite side near the 'Croydon Advertiser Family Stand' at the end closest to the Whitehorse Lane End. Over 2,000 away supporters can be accommodated here but there are many bad seats that need to be avoided if possible. Seats toward the rear of the stand are wooden with little leg room and hindered views from an overhanging roof and a supporting pillar. action is not particularly great from the back of the stand, due to the television gantry that has been installed above the visitors stand, do not to buy tickets the back ten rows (40-49)' and their then there is the odd supporting pillars to contend with as well.



Arthur Wait Stand

Food on offer inside the ground includes; Cheeseburgers £4.50, Palace Ale Hot Dogs £5, Hot Dogs £4, Chicken Burgers £4.50, Steak & Cronx Ale Pie £4, Soulfood Tomato & Black Bean Pots £5 and Chips £2.50. There is good food at Craft of Coffee on South Norwood Road and even better pies and other food at Essence of Cake in Falkland Avenue just past Selhurst Park.

For drinking if coming off at Thornton Heath Railway Station there is the 'The Flora Sandes' 2-4 Ambassador House on Bridstock Road which is popular with both home and away supporters and directly across from Thornton Heath Station. Also close by is 'The Railway Telegraph' at 19 Bridstock Road

The Railway Telegraph is a family friendly pub and has a lovely patio garden and outside smoking area. As you come out of Thornton Heath station turn right and the pub is further down on the left 50 yards from the station. They also have Sky Sports and welcome football supporters from home or away. No food is served at present. Otherwise near Norwood Junction Railway Station on the High Street is another Wetherspoon outlet called 'The William Stanley' from the Station walk up Oliver Grove turn right at the Clock Tower into the High Street past the Alliance Pub and cross the road and friendly staff with Real Ale if that is your drink.

Driving Directions



North and West

M1 to A406 North Circular Road heading west to Chiswick Roundabout, take the third exit at the roundabout onto Chiswick High Road, then first left onto the A205 signposted Kew. After 2m, take a left at the T-junction signposted Putney. Continue until the road merges with the A3, then a mile later, turn right onto the A214 (Signposted Tooting and Streatham). When in Streatham, turn right onto the A23 Streatham High Road and after one mile turn left into the B273 Green Lane which becomes Parchmore Road. At the bottom of the road, turn left into the High Street, go straight over the crossroads and the ground is on the right.



East

Take the M25 to Junction 3 then fourth exit onto the A20 (Signposted London), and then after 4 miles turn left onto the A224 (signposted St Mary Cray). After 3mile turn onto the A232 Spur Road and follow this until you see Shirley Park Golf Club, then turn right onto the A215 Shirley Road. Turn right at the top of this road, then first left into the A215 Spring Road. After 1.5 miles, turn left onto the B266 and the ground is 250 yards on the left.



South

Leave the M25 at Junction 3 take the first exit onto the M23 and then follow the A23 into London following signs for Thornton Heath, turning right onto the A235 passing through a one-way system. Turn immediately left onto the B266 Brigstock Road which becomes High Street then as north.

Most streets around the ground are either designated residents only parking on match days or are pay and display with a four hours limit. So please take note of any street signs advising of parking restrictions, or else you win run the risk of being towed away. Please note that the traffic can be pretty bad on Saturdays even without football traffic.

So, use Basingstoke Railway Station in the East, Gatwick Airport in the South, Watford Junction Railway Station North West or Stanstead Airport in the North East get an Oyster Visitor card and take the tube and park outside London at most it will cost £8.50 for travel their and back but it means you can get on buses, trains and tube with one ticket. (Remember when you get off the buses or trains scan your card at the either Yellow or Pink scanners)

If you wish to park near the ground then use the car park at 21 Belgrave Road SE25 5AL run by the council its £4.00 from 1pm to 6pm on Saturday and for midweek games from 6pm to 11pm.

Ground Guide

The Main Stand on Stevenage Road was originally designed by Archibald Leitch (who designed a number of football grounds in the UK in the early part of the 20th century) and replaced four separate stands known as the Rabbit Hutches and was opened in 1905.

Although it has a number of supporting pillars and old wooden seating in its upper tier, they are one of few in Scotland and England to keep the classic looking gable on its roof; with the club's name Fulham Football Club between it. The main Stand which has recently been renamed the Johnny Haynes Stand after the former Fulham great who played between 1952 -70 and the Pavilion to the side of the last one standing in British Football (The last one in Scotland was at Broomfield in Airdrie) which sits neatly between the Main and the Putney Stands.

Opposite the main Stand is the aptly named Riverside Stand. With its back to the banks of the River Thames, this all seated, it also has a row of executive boxes running across the back of it and also houses a television gantry and it has a couple of supporting pillars and now has a capacity of 9,000 which replaced the old 1972 stand in 2022, within the stand

include restaurants, meeting facilities, bars, nine flats and a new riverside walkway behind it and has raised the capacity of Craven Cottage to 29,600.



Jonny Hayes Stand

Both the Hammersmith End has one large pillar towards the front and middle of the stand, whilst opposite the Putney End has a row of pillars running across the stand, about a third of the way down it replaced terracing and are simulate stands. Attached to these stands in three corners of the ground are three storey structures that are used to for corporate boxes.

An unusual feature is that the teams enter the field from one corner of the ground at the Pavilion (The Cottage) and then make their way up onto the pitch as it is raised. There is a small electric scoreboard situated above the Putney End and outside the stadium alongside Stevenage Road is the Johnny Haynes Statue.

Away fans are housed to one side of the Putney End Stand on the river side of the ground. This stand is shared with 'neutral' supporters, with away fans being allocated approximately 2,700 seats in this stand. There are a couple of supporting pillars that could impede your view, but this only applies to certain seats in Row DD and above. Some of these are classed as 'restricted view' seats and are discounted off the regular ticket price and the grub on the concourses on offer includes a range of Pies (£4.50), Cheeseburgers (£5) and "Moms Bad Boy Hot Dogs" (£5) with flat screen televisions showing the game being played inside.

It is best to use the bakeries like the Bake House on North Richmond Road 50 yards from Putney Railway Station or if you come of at Putney Bridge then walk up to Cake & Leaves in Fulham Park Garden or Danish Pastries on Munster Road



The Riverside End

Dukes Head is an away friendly pub that at 8 Lower Richmond near Putney Bridge railway station come out of the station cross over the river and turn right the pub is two minutes away their good friendly atmosphere good food and a good selection of beer and a family run pub.

Lowcountry Pub formerly Zulu's is an away friendly pub located at 4 Fulham High Street and is on the way from Putney Rail Station just take the evening directions to the game the pub is on the righthand side, the menu includes a variety of steaks and seafood. Crawfish, steamed cracked crabs; and seafood gumbo, served with andouille sausage are some of the unique offerings and excellent selections of beers.

Near to Putney tube station is the 'Eight Bells' but if you find it full then head for the "The Temperance" which is only a few mins walk away on the corner of Fulham High Street and prices were reasonable and the service excellent. And opposite the Temperance on the same road is the King's Arms, which is also popular with visiting supporters.

The Crabtree on Rainville Road (10 mins walk from the ground) also welcomes all away supporters and to find this pub go along Stevenage Road away from the Cottage and the away end. On reaching the home end of the ground, turn left along an alley which runs behind the stand and when you reach the River Thames turn right and walk along the riverside path and the pubs on your right.

If you like Wetherspoons pubs, then on the opposite side of the Thames to the ground is the Rocket pub and from the Putney Bridge tube station go on up to the main road, then cross the Thames via Putney Bridge and over on your left you will see a semi-circular tower located on the river front and it is located at the bottom of this tower and once over the bridge look for the path on the left taking you down to the river bank and walk along from there.

If arrive at Putney Overground Railway Station then there is a pub virtually opposite the station entrance called the Railway which is a large and there was a good mix of supporters inside all getting on fine.

Driving Directions



Take the M1 to Junction1 then turn right onto A406 North Circular Road heading west. Continue for 4m until you get to the Hangar Lane roundabout. Go straight over onto Hangar Lane. After 2m, you will see Gunnersbury Park and shortly after this Chiswick roundabout.

Take the second exit onto the A4 and at the next roundabout (Hogarth), take the first exit, continuing along the A4 Great West Road. After 1m, you will get to Hammersmith, follow the one-way system until heading back in the direction you came from and turn left onto the A219 Fulham Palace Road. After 1 mile, then turn right into Inglethorpe Street, and at the bottom, turn left into Stevenage Road and the ground is on the right.



South

Take the A24 into London. At the crossroads with the A214 by Tooting Bec station, turn left onto Trinity Road and after 1.5m turn left onto the A3. One mile later, the road forks in two, take the right-hand lane, Upper Richmond Road, and then turn right at the next crossroads into Putney High Street. Continue across Putney Bridge, then after 700yards, turn left into Findlay Street, turning right at the bottom for the ground.

If you want to park your car then use Smugglers Way, London SW18 1DB car park there is

usual a number of spaces and there is security walking around and it only a fifteen-minute walk to the ground



Ground Guide

The ground is dominated by the East Stand on one side of the stadium. This stand which holds around 17,000 supporters was opened in the 1992-93 season, and is at least twice the size of the other three stands at Elland Road. The Away fans are housed up to 5,000 between this stand and the South Stand

The East Stand is a two tier stand which has a large lower tier of seating with a smaller tier above. In-between the two tiers are a row of executive boxes. The stand is completed by a large imposing roof. The rest of the stadium is that it is totally enclosed, with the corners of the ground being filled with seating.

All the remaining stands have a number of supporting pillars and at the back of the West Stand (which was renamed in March 2004, the 'John Charles Stand' in honour of their former great player), the stand was first opened in 1957. This stand also houses the team dugouts and television gantry. There is an electric scoreboard in one corner of the ground between the

South & John Charles Stands. Outside the stadium there are statues of Billy Bremmer and Don Revie.

From the North West

Take the M62 to Junction 27 and then follow signs for the M621. Join the M621 and after one and a half miles leave the motorway at the junction 2 with the A643. Then at the roundabout take the third exit into Elland Road Go down past the ground on your right and the Old Peacock pub on your left, you will come to a couple of entrances to the large car park which cost £5.

Ground Guide

The ground is lot smaller than their neighbours Everton across Stanley Park but the one open and famous Kop Terrace which was covered in the 1960's and was finally demolished was replaced in 1994 by a huge stand, designed to emulate the atmosphere of the old Kop, hence it's semi-circular look and large single tier.

Opposite the Kop is the Anfield Road Stand, part of which is given to away supporters, is the most recent addition to the ground, having been opened in 1998. It boosted not only the overall capacity of the stadium, finally gave an enclosed feel as the remaining corners were filled.

Opposite the Main Stand is the Centenary Stand, where the front tier leg room was measured for a midget but has now been upgraded to a more modern stand with the Centenary Stand was originally called the Kemlyn Road Stand, part of which was built in the 1960's with an additional tier and row of executive boxes being added in 1992.

The Main Stand which was opened in 1973 and it was looking its age with a number of

supporting pillars before the Main Stand with two extra tiers have made this stand simply huge, having increased the capacity of the stand from 12,000 to 20,500 and increased the overall capacity of Anfield to over 54,000. The expanded Main Stand now towers of the rest of the stadium. The Main Stand itself looks smart with single rows of executive boxes located between the tiers and having the players tunnel and team dugouts located at out front. Its most striking feature though is its roof and mostly made up of transparent panels to allow more light to the pitch like Bayern Munich, it protrudes out over the stand by quite some distance and is curved to each side of the stand



Main Stand

The Arkle at 77 Anfield Road for both Liverpool as well as Everton games it offers a wellstocked bar and always has a lively and welcoming atmosphere but it does get busy so The Flat Iron which was five minutes' walk away and although the pub was mostly full of Liverpool fans, the bars were mixed and all were very friendly.



Centenary Stand

To find this pub, turn left at the junction where Arkles is (opposite direction to where Anfield is over to your right) onto Anfield Road and head away from the ground and the pub is down at the bottom of this road on the righthand side'. Otherwise located near to the away turnstiles is a food and drink area, which serves alcohol too. Bottles of Carlsberg (500ml) are also available inside the stadium, at a cost of £3.90 each.

Around the outside of the ground, there are the Bill Shankly Gates on Anfield Road. These wrought iron gates have the phrase 'You'll Never Walk Alone' displayed in gold letters above them. There is also a statue of Scotsman, Bill Shankly the man who started there run of titles and European adventures placed near the Club shop. Also along Anfield Road, there is the memorial to the 97 victims of the Hillsborough disaster.

Visiting supporters are located in the lower tier of the Anfield Road stand (on the main stand side) where there are seats for up to 3000 fans. Views are generally good but try to avoid the seats in the back three or four rows of the lower tier as it can become very difficult to see if people in front aren't sitting down. There is a betting outlet and the refreshment kiosks sell a wide variety of Pies including a 'Scouse Pie', Potato and Meat, Potato and Butter, Cheese Slices and Sausage Rolls (all £3.40). But I use any one of three bakeries on the County Road in Greggs, Patisserie and Pound Bakery saves money for things you like to wash it down with.

Driving Directions



From the M6 exit at junction 26 onto the M58 and continue until the end. At junction 7 turn left onto the A59 Ormskirk Road. Continue on this road until it becomes Rice Lane and cross over the roundabout into County Road. After 1/4 mile turn left into Everton Valley and then Walton Lane with Goodison Road and the ground are on the left.



South

Take the M6 exit at junction 21a onto the M62. Exit the M62 at Junction 4 and then follow the A5058 towards Liverpool. After three miles turn left at the traffic lights into Utting Avenue (At McDonalds) on the corner of this junction. Go along for one mile and then turn right then turn right at the Arkle pub for the ground. If you arrive early then there is street parking to be found around Walton Lane if not then you should park over towards Everton FC or in Stanley Park itself with the entrance to the car park which costs £8, is in Priory Road just past the Gulf petrol station.



Ground Guide

The Club moved to the then called City Of Manchester Stadium (Eastlands) in August 2003 after playing at Maine Road since 1913. The stadium was originally built for the Manchester Commonwealth Games, held in 2002 and cost in the region of £90m to construct.

After that event it was agreed Manchester City would become the new tenants, with the club spending £20m in refitting costs, including the removal of the track and extending the stands further downwards and adding a further 10,000 seats to the capacity so that the spectator areas are closer to the playing action. And the ground was fully enclosed when a roof was also added to one end of the stadium.



The stadium has a bowl design and is totally enclosed. Both stands on either side of the pitch are virtually identical, three tiered, with a row of executive boxes running across the stands between the second and third tiers and the West Stand was named after City legend Colin Bell.

The North and South ends are smaller in size, being two tiers high, again with a row of executive boxes, but this time running across the back just below the roof. Both these ends are of the more traditional rectangular design.

The upper tiers are steeper than the lower, ensuring that spectators are kept close to the playing action. The stadium also has two large video screens in opposite corners of the ground. Outside the ground near the main club entrance is a memorial garden.

Away fans are located in one side of the South Stand at one end of the ground, spread across the upper, middle, and lower tiers, where up to 3,000 fans can be accommodated (4,500 for cup games). The concourse has food Hot Dogs (£4.50) and a range of pies; Peppered Steak, Chicken Balti, Potato and Meat, plus Cheese & Onion (all £4 each). The best food and pastries

are the Wrapit, Triangle Shopping Centre, Manchester M4 3TR and for coffee or tea then Java bar at Manchester Victoria station good value and at Manchester Piccadilly there is Esquires on Whitworth Street just 100 yards from the station.

North/South

Leave the M6 at Junction 19 and (take the first exit from the North and Third from the South) then follow the A556 towards Stockport and then join the M56 at Junction 8 taking the third exit on to it and going towards Stockport. Continue onto the M60 heading on towards Ashton under Lyne. Then leave the M60 at Junction 23 and take the A635 towards Manchester. Take the second on the right onto Ashton New Road towards Droylsden and stay on the road for around three miles and you will reach the Stadium on your right.



West/East

Leave the M62 at Junction 18 and then join the M60 then leave the M60 at Junction 23 and take the third exit at the roundabout following the signs for the A635 towards Manchester. Then take second on the right onto Ashton New Road towards Droylsden/Manchester. Stay on the A662 for around three miles and you will reach the Stadium on your right.

There is some parking available at the stadium itself which costs £10 per car with the East Car Park is nearest to the away entrance. Please be aware that there is a resident's only parking scheme in place in the streets near to the ground, which extends about a mile out from the stadium. I park in the K2 car park, which is a field/scrubland, located on Ashton Old Road (A635) just before the junction with Pottery Lane and Hyde Road. The entrance is on the south carriageway of Ashton Old Road roughly about 200 yards from the junction (postcode M11 3AA will get you right outside the entrance). It cost £7, and is infinity throughout the afternoon. The stadium is 15 minutes' walk turn left at the lights on to Alan Turning Way keep straight on at the junction and after preceding up the road you will come to the stadium on your left.

Ground Guide

Old Trafford has over the last couple of decades raising its capacity off 76,100, making it the largest Club ground in Britain. Both ends, which look almost identical, are large two-tiered stands, which were originally built in the early 1990's and had an additional tier added at the turn of the millennium. Each are quite steep, with a large lower tier and smaller upper tier.

The three tiered renamed the Sir Alex Ferguson Stand, opened in 1996, at one side of the ground, is the largest capacity stand in England. The corners to each side of this stand are also filled with seating and extend around to meet both ends.

These stands dwarf the older Main (South) Stand opposite. This stand is single tiered, with a television gantry suspended below its roof. All the stands have a row of executive boxes at the back of the lower tier.



North Stand

The best views of the ground are from the front of this stand and from the away section, as you look out upon the three newer, larger sides. Because there is still a centre tunnel in the main stand between the dugouts



South Stand

Unusual aspects of the ground include the raised pitch, and that the teams enter the field from the corner of the Main Stand and not from the middle tunnel. Outside the ground is the Sir Matt Busby Statue fronting the impressive green glassed East Stand facade, outside the North Stand is a statue of Sir Alex Ferguson. There is also a clock and plaque in remembrance of the Munich disaster of 1958. Across Sir Matt Busby Way is the recently erected to United Holy Trinity Statue of three of the 1968 European Cup team; George Best, Denis Law and Bobby Charlton.



Stretford End

Away supporters are normally located in one corner of the ground, taking up part of the East and Sir Bobby Charlton Stands. The views from the away sections are excellent and up to 3,000 away supporters can be accommodated and when you get to the concourse there is enough food and drinks outlets that the queues never seem to get too long. These sell a range of pies; Meat & Potato, Steak, Chicken Balti, a 'United' Pie, which I believe is a Spicy Chicken Pie. In addition, a 'Limited Edition' pie which varies from match to match (all Pies £4 each). Other refreshments on offer include; Cheese & Onion Pasties (£3.80) and Rollover Hot Dogs (£4.60) and at the far end of the concourse is a large flat screen television showing Sky Sports.

The best food and pastries the Wrapit, Triangle Shopping Centre, Manchester M4 3TR and for coffee or tea then Java bar at Manchester Victoria Station good value and at Manchester Piccadilly there is Esquires on Whitworth Street just 100 yards from the station.

Leave the M6 at Junction 19 and follow the A556 towards Altrincham. At the Little Bonnington roundabout go straight onto Chester Road/ A56 towards Manchester carry straight through Altrincham. Keep on the A56 for 8 miles and then you will come to see Sir Matt Busby Way on your left. It best you park in Altrincham and take the Metro straight to Old Trafford as there is little parking around the ground



North

Leave the M6 at Junction 30 and take the M61 towards Bolton. At the end of the M61, join the M60 at Junction 14. Leave the M60 at Junction 9 and follow the A5081/ Park Way to the Trafford Centre and park the car here it's free and take the Metro or walk to the ground it's just over a mile.



West/East

Follow M56 until its end and then take the M60 (W&N) as for Trafford Centre and at Junction 7 leave M60 and take the A56 towards Stretford and then stay on the A56 for 2.1 miles then you will come to see Sir Matt Busby Way on your left.

The ground is half a mile down this road on your left, although on match days this road may be closed to traffic. So, park at the Trafford Centre Car Park it's so big they don't have a restriction on time and take the Metro or walk to the ground it's just over a mile.

The alternative parking is at Media City in Salford Quays on the banks of Manchester's historic ship canal. Old Trafford and is a 25 minutes' walk or take the metro from Media City to Pomona and walk five minutes down to the ground outside the car park making this an ideal location for supporters to leave their vehicles. The car park is easily accessible via Junction 2 on the M602 leaving the M60 at Junction 12 allowing us bypass the usual traffic queues around Old Trafford and for a three hour stay the cost will be circa £4.50.

The alternative is to take the train to **Old Trafford Halt Railway Station** next to the ground which is located next to Lancashire County Cricket Club on Warwick Road, which leads up to Sir Matt Busby Way. The railway station is less busy than the Metro and is best used after the game as everybody takes the metro.

The ground was largely rebuilt in the 1990's and is now unrecognisable from the St James' Park of old. The East Stand was rebuilt and North and South Corners added and the South Enclosure was demolished and a new two-tier stand was built.



The club finished rebuilding the stadium with the additional tier to the Milburn and Sir John Hall Stands in 2000, the capacity has been increased to over 52,000. These stands have a huge lower tier, with a row of executive boxes and a smaller tier above.

However, the ground now looks somewhat imbalanced with one half of the ground being significantly larger than the other two sides. These remaining two sides the Gallowgate (South Stand) End and East Stand are both of the same height and are two-tired. The stadium is also totally enclosed with all four corners being filled with seating.



Sir John Hall Stand

Away fans are housed on the very far side of the Leazes Stand, in the top tier. Up to 3,000 supporters can be accommodated in this section for league games and a larger allocation is available for cup games. It is quite a climb of 14 flights of stairs up to the away section (There is a lift available if you are unable to take the stairs) and that you are situated quite far away from the pitch but on the plus side, you do get a wonderful view of the whole stadium, plus the Newcastle skyline and countryside in the distance.

Also, the leg room and height between rows are some the best that I have come across and the facilities on offer are pretty good. Away fans also get the best view of the new video screen that has been installed as it is located on that side of the stand. The concourse is spacious and there is a fair selection of pies on offer including the Chicken Balti Pie (£3.50), plus the usual burgers and hot dogs, all served in Newcastle United branded packaging but it best to go to the Pink Lane for Coffee & Tea at 1 Pink Lane 20 yards from the railway station and for pies the Pink Lane Bakery at 40 Pink Lane (not very good for the waist line).

The Goose is an away friendly pub. This pub is located at Percy Street take a right just before St James metro and walk up Percy Street and it's just before the bridge on the left A very large pub (part of the Goose pub chain) that was previously known as Scruffy Murphy's and The Filament and Firkin. From the main entrance there is a long wooden bar to the righthand side and the furnishings are of a very smart wooden mahogany style. There is an abundance of seating throughout with a mixture of high and low tables and chairs. There good on offer of food and loads of beer to be sampled.


From the A1 until take the Junction (Signposted Jedburgh/ City Centre/ A167) and keep on the left hand lane and take the first exit on the roundabout onto the A167 go straight over four roundabouts and take the second exit of the A167 and at the t Junction take a right after this

at the roundabout take the second exit into Claremount Road then at the next roundabout take the third exit into Queen Victoria Road the parking here is in a multi storey and allows a reasonably quick getaway after the game and its only 800 feet from the stadium.

Continue to the next roundabout and take the second exit then at the lights turn left onto High Street and continue over the River Tyne on the Tyne Bridge, from which the ground can be clearly seen. Carry on straight up the dual carriageway (St James Boulevard/M167) and come off at the junction for City Centre (North) and come on to the Great North Road at the lights take a left into Claremount Street then continue up the hill to the roundabout then take a left and park at the Hospital and allows a reasonably quick getaway after the game and its only 800 feet from the stadium.

The ground sitting on the banks of the River Trent is like the Old Meadow Ground in Shrewsbury the ground is a roads width from the river. Two ends were re-developed during the 1990's.

At one end, the Bridgford Stand houses away fans in the lower tier up to 4,500 away fans are accommodated but do not use the front few rows when raining you will get very wet, to get there is to go through the car park via Scarrington Road of Lady Bay Bridge with the corners filled in between it and the Brian Clough Stand.

Opposite, the Trent End, is the most recent addition to the ground. It is a large two-tiered stand that looks quite smart. One unusual feature of the stand is that running across the middle are a number of rows of seating enclosed within a covered shaded glass area. On one side there is a two-tiered stand, with executive boxes in between, which was built in 1980.

Once called the Executive Stand, it was recently renamed the Brian Clough Stand in honour of their greatest manager. Facing this is a smaller and much older Main Stand. Unlike some grounds the food is well priced and the burgers are very good with onions.

Food inside the ground includes a range of Pukka Pies; Chicken Balti, Meat and Potato, Cheese and Onion (all £3), plus Cornish Pasties (£3) and Sausage Rolls (£2.30). Also available are Cheeseburgers (£3.60), Burgers (£3.40) and Hot Dogs (£3.40) so get your food outside the ground at Poundway near to the station.



Brian Clough Stand

For drinking turn up County Road for a pint at the Meadows Notts County Social Club if county is away from home (cheap booze) and then go up to the next junction and walk across via Lady Bay Bridge and then take the steps down to the Trent River and amble to the ground. The Nottingham Rowing Club beside the ground welcomes all away fans and neutrals for a small fee but its only 20 yards from the ground.



Trent End (Dan)

If you want a pub in the centre of Town then the Company Inn just of Canal Street at Castle Wharf good food and a section of real ale just come out of the station turn left walk up Carrington Road then take a left walk down the canal takes the bridge and walk up to the pub.

The visit to Ye old trip To Jerusalem pub in Brewhouse Yard Castle Road, is one of England's oldest pubs Great little old pub nice good food the staff very helpful dinner is really nice. There are lots to see while you're there and it as a good selection of beers and wines.

Then after two miles on Clifton Lane take the junction for A46/ A606/ Grantham/ Newark / Melton and take the first exit on to the B679 Wilfred Lane go through one roundabout and turn left into Loughborough Road and take the first right after Trent Bridge into Radcliffe Road then take the first left into Pavilion Road and park down by the rowing club for £4.00 which is situated 30 yards from the ground.



The Alternative is to leave at Junction 21A for Braunstone & Kirkby Muxloe (as Junction 24 can be a nightmare to get through on a Saturday) on to the A46 follow it right at the fork, follow signs for A46/Leicester North/Newark and merge onto A46 and after 7 miles you will come to the Syston Roundabout take the first exit to keep on the A46 then after about ten miles take the exit for Nottingham and Melton Mowbray A606 and at the roundabout take the first exit continue on the is road for about five miles then at the roundabout take the third exit to keep on the A606 and follow this road into Nottingham take the first right after Trent Bridge into Radcliffe Road then take the first left into Pavilion Road and park down by the rowing club for £4.00 which is situated 30 yards from the ground.





The Club moved from their former home of Roker Park where they had played for 99 years to the Stadium of Light in 1997, on the site of the former Wearmouth Colliery their club placed behind the West Stand there is a large red wheel, an emblem of the lifts that used to take the miners down to the coal face.

The stadium is of a good size, is totally enclosed and on the whole is quite impressive. It is composed of two three tiered stands at the North end and the West side of the ground, whilst the others are two tiered. The West (Main) Stand on one side also has a row of executive boxes (which you can sit outside if you wish), that are situated just below the top tier. Currently the away section is in the South Stand where 7000 fans can be accommodated.

However, if at some point the Club were to add an additional tier to the two remaining sides, then an even more remarkable stadium would emerge. There is also a large electronic scoreboard perched upon the roof at either end.

The PA system deafening especially when the classical piece of music is played before the players come on to the pitch at the start of the game and U2's 'Elevation', as the teams come out of the tunnel and outside the stadium behind the South Stand there is a statue of former FA Cup winning manager Bob Stoker, as well as some reminders of the Colliery, as also outside one corner of the stadium is a large miners lamp.

For away fans The Albion pub on Victor Street is 17 minutes away from the ground and a 14-minute walk from either St Peters or Stadium of Light metro stops, is a small pub the size of a house They serve food from there set menus the food has had here has been nice and drinks are not bad prices. They have pool tables and darts and show all the football matches on big screens so if you want a quiet drink I would stay away on match days as it gets packed out with supporters.

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North

Exit the A1 at Junction 62, at Seaton and follow the signs for Cramlington/ Blyth/ Ashington and at the roundabout, take the 3rd exit onto A19 (Signposted Tyne Tunnel, Newcastle Docks/ Blyth/ Ashington) then follow the A19 through three roundabouts and through the Tyne Tunnel and Jarrow



After about three miles, stay in the left-hand lane and take the second slip road towards Sunderland (Signposted Stadium of Light, A1231 Sunderland). This takes you onto a bridge crossing over the River Wear. Turn right onto the A1231 following the signs for Sunderland. Go straight over four roundabouts into Sunderland on Washington Highway, and then follow the signposts to the ground.



Take A1 (M) to junction 35 then go along Westway/ A195 then at the first roundabout take the first exit onto Washington Highway and take the second exit off and then take the third exit onto Sunderland Way then at the sixth roundabout on Queens Way take the second exit then the second exit at the next roundabouts into the ground.



I have always like going to the old White Hart Lane ever since my first visit back in 1965 when I was taken by my dad who was playing for the opposition that day. It always had a good atmosphere in the old days.

The new White Hart Lane Ground has a capacity of 62,062 it is the second largest stadium in the Premier League. The design and quality of build too has been built very much with the fan experience in mind and it boasts some great facilities and inside the stadium, you notice its large curved roof that sweeps around the ground. Although essentially a bowl design like Wembley and Highbury, the new stadium with the main West Stand on one side and the East Stand opposite, are very similar both being four-tiered. Both have a large top and lower tier, with two smaller tiers sandwiched in-between. These two smaller tiers are for corporate hospitality areas. Above the tiered areas below the roof, there is a glassed fronted area running along the length of the stands. The West Stand is the 'Main Stand' having the team dugouts situated out front. At the Paxton End the stand is three-tiered, whilst opposite the club have built the single largest stand in the country and although this stand has just two tiers, it has a staggering 17.500 seats, in 82 rows



South Stand (Park Lane End)

Entrance to the stadium is gained by a security cordon at Gate 11 for away fans are housed in the lower tier of the North East corner of the stadium, where up to 3,000 fans for League matches. A much larger visiting allocation of up to 9,000 can be made available for domestic cup ties and for these matches visiting fans will be housed in the same area of the stadium but over the three tiers with a great view of the action from this section.

The Walkabout at 56 Shepherds Bush Green next to QPR ground is the away supports pub for match days. The atmosphere is incredibly friendly and good times are guaranteed every day of the week. The meals are cheap, delicious the beers are always flowing everywhere you look there is a plasma TV. One of the best places for watching live sport in London then take the N22 to the ground.



The ground was built for the 2012 Olympics, the London Stadium cost in the region of £500m to build and originally it had a capacity of 80,000, but this has since been reduced to an all seated capacity of 60,000 and since 2012 a further £200m has been spent on further upgrading the facilities, including the construction of the largest cantilevered roof in the World and the build quality of the stadium is excellent and it is certainly up there as being one of the best in the country.


Away fans are housed in the both the upper and lower tiers in the South West part of the stadium, where just under 3,000 can be accommodated for League games (or up to 8,000 for domestic cup ties). Everybody enjoy fine unobstructed views, however some fans are housed quite far away from the playing area, especially at the back of the upper tier, so get yourself a seat in the lower tier or at the front of the upper tier and due to the nature of the retractable seating for athletics there is a fair gap between the lower and upper tiers of the visiting fans sections.



On the plus side the facilities inside the stadium are excellent, with ample food and drink outlets located on spacious concourses. And of course, a visit to a game of football wouldn't be complete without a pie, although it will set you back £4.20 for a choice of Steak and Ale, Chicken and Vegetable or Vegetarian Pie. Even the toilets, which when I compare to other grounds that I have visited, can only be described as more of akin to a hotel rather than a stadium.

Go to Pound Bakery next to the station for your pies save money for the away fans there are a few pubs like The Goose pub at 78 Broadway were away fans are made welcome and you can bring the kids in, there is the Hamilton Hall Wetherspoons pub at Liverpool Street Station before journeying onto Stratford and the Stadium.

There are a number of eating places and restaurants within the nearby Westfield Shopping Centre that also serve alcohol and The 'Cow' on Westfield Avenue, but there is also a bar inside Aspers Casino, as well as the Holiday Inn, which are all situated on the Westfield complex and just outside Stratford International Station there is the 'Tap East' at 7 International Square, Montfichet Road which brews its own beers and if you are coming from Hackney Wick station there are two bars that also are attached to breweries, The CRATE at near the station and the 'Howling Hops' are both housed next door to one another in an old warehouse complex at Unit 7 and 9A Queen's Yard, White Post Lane and whilst just a little further along the canal from these brew pubs (in the opposite direction to the stadium) is Mason & Company which is a Craft Beer and Italian Food outlet at 25 E Bay Lane.

Leave the M25 at Junction 27 and take the M11 towards London. At the end of the M11 motorway keep in the righthand lane and follow the signs for the North Circular A406 (W). At the bottom of the flyover where the roads merge, move into the left-hand lane for the A12. At the roundabout take the fourth exit onto the A12 towards Central London and Stratford. Keep straight on the A12 for around four and a half miles at this point you should be able to see the Velodrome building over on your left. Exit here onto the A106, signposted Stratford and Westfield. At the bottom of the slip road at the traffic lights, take the left-hand filter lane, towards Stratford and Westfield. Continue along this road and you will reach the stadium on the right and the Westfield Centre on the left. Just before the Westfield Shopping Centre you will reach a set of traffic lights, where you turn left for the Westfield Car Park, A, B & C, which are clearly signposted from this point. So, park outside of London and save you some money and follow the transport guide from the North you should park at Luton Parkway Railway Station and from the South and South West at Heathrow Airport you will get home quicker than trying to get out of Stratford on a Saturday.

Ground Guide

The new Stan Cullis Stand at one end of the stadium. This impressive looking structure towers over the rest of Molineux and the stand is two tiered, with a larger lower tier, with the upper tier having a large windshield on one side. The stand extends partly around one corner towards the Steve Bull Stand and some seats in the upper tier in that corner will have a restricted view of the playing area, due to the roof of the Steve Bull Stand being directly in the line of sight.



Stan Cullis Stand

Away fans are normally housed on one side of the new Stan Cullis Stand, where around 1,600 fans can be accommodated and are housed in both the upper and lower tiers, although tickets for the upper sections are sold first. For games where there is a larger away following, then the away fans are not given an 'end' as such, but are instead housed in the lower tier of the Steve Bull Stand along the side of the pitch where up to 2,750 are accommodated.



Jack Harris Stand

Both sides of the stadium are two-tiered covered stands that have a row of executive boxes situated along the middle. They are unusual in being oval in shape using the old contours of the old ground, meaning that those sitting on the half way line are furthest away from the playing action.

The oldest of these is the Steve Bull Stand, which was opened in 1979, whilst opposite is the Billy Wright Stand which was opened in 1993. This stand is the Main Stand (Billy Wright Stand) at Molineux, which contains the Directors area, team dugouts in front and a television gantry below its roof.



Steve Bull and Stan Cullis Stands

At one end is the Jack Harris Stand, which was also opened in 1993, and this is a large single tiered stand, situated in the corner between the Jack Harris and Billy Wright stands, is a temporary stand that has a capacity of 900 seats. The seats are green coloured which makes it look a little out of place to the rest of the stadium. This is affectionately known as the Wolves Community Trust End and this is the only area is open to the elements.

Away fans are housed in the lower tier of the Steve Bull Stand, which runs along one side of the pitch, where up to 2,750 away supporters can be housed. For cup games then if required part of the Stan Cullis Stand at one can also be allocated, where an additional 1,500 visiting fans can be housed, high up on one side of the upper tier (towards the Steve Bull Stand side of the ground).

The facilities are fine, including the catering, serving a range of pies including; Steak, Rogan Josh, Potato & Meat, Vegetable, Cheese & Onion (all £3.10), Cornish Pasty (£3.10), Sausage Rolls (£3.10) Hot Dogs (£3.60), Burgers (£3.60) and Chips (£2.50). So, use the Pound Bakery in Queen Street great pies and save money for the better things.

The Walkabout bar on Queen Street 100 yards from the station staff always great, decent prices and a massive projector screen for sports. they always have loads of different channels of sport and you get checked in and out by some of the meanest people on the door as this is the dedicated away pub so no home fans.

The Bluebrick inside the Premier Inn hotel, located near to the railway station, but it does though charge a £2 entrance fee. If arriving by train then as you leave the station entrance, turn right and you will see a walkway going down under the station and at the bottom of the walkway turn left and after a short walk you will see the Bluebrick over on your right.

Alcohol is available inside the stadium this includes Carling (Pint £3.70), Banks's Bitter (Can 440ml £3.40), Aston Manor Cider (Bottle 500ml £3.70), Magners Cider (Bottle 330ml £4), Guinness (Can 520ml £4), plus wine and spirits (£4).

The two statues that sit outside the ground statue of Billy Wright and sit outside the main entrance to the club offices and the other is of former player and manager Stan Cullis and The Stan Cullis Statue is located outside the entrance to the Club Museum.

Driving Directions



North

Leave the M6 at Junction 12 and take the A5 towards Telford and then the first turn on the left onto the A449 towards Wolverhampton. On reaching the traffic island that intersects with the ring road, turn right. Then follow the directions from the South. Alternatively, if you carry on at the lights then into the city centre into Slateford Road and then take the third exit at the roundabout at the University you will find a space in the Civic Hall Car Park, and this remains open for night matches and costs £2.70 for three hours or £3 for evenings



South

Leave the M6 at Junction 10 and take the A454 towards Wolverhampton. Continue to follow the A454 right into Wolverhampton (be wary of speed cameras on the A454). On reaching the traffic island that intersects with the ring road, turn right. As you approach the second set of lights look for the signs for football parking and the ground is over the second set of lights on the right.

Public Transport

Take the train to **Wolverhampton Railway Station** which is in the centre of city is 14 minutes to the ground. Leave the main station entrance and go straight on to Wednesfield Road then turn left towards the town centre and as you reach the inner ring road turn right. Just follow the ring road as it continues in a circular pattern (This side is known as St Patricks) around to the right and turn into Waterloo Road Molineux on the right.



Ground Guide

The National Stadium is that it has its own individual identity and character and from the moment you see the Arch towering over the stadium in the distance, then you know that this is going to be something special, and unlike a number of other stadiums around the world that host a number of sporting events including football, Wembley is primarily for football and is the home of the England team.

The stadium is totally enclosed and comprises three tiers, with both sides of the stadium being slightly larger than the ends. These sides are semi-circular in construction and although on a larger scale and both these side stands large upper and lower tiers, with a smaller middle tier sandwiched in-between. This middle tier overhangs the large lower tier and has a row of executive boxes at the back of it.



At each end there is a large video screen, which is moulded into the third and hence is an integral part of the stadium. The stadium has a complicated looking roof that initially appears retractable and unlike the old stadium whereby the players would enter the field of play from a tunnel at one end, the players now enter the field in the conventional way, onto the half way line from the North Stand, where the Royal Box is situated. Unlike the old Wembley there are enough shops to feed the crowd and over 2,000 Toilets so there is no queue.

Driving Directions



The stadium is well signposted from the end of the M1 & M40. Basically, the stadium is just off the A406 North Circular Road and at the roundabout at the end of the M1, turns right onto the A406 (North Circular/West Wembley). Continue along the A406 for a couple of miles and then after crossing a metal suspended bridge, you will pass a McDonalds on your left. At the traffic lights with an Ikea Store on one corner bear left onto Drury Way and keeping the Ikea store on your right go straight across the next two roundabouts. You will pass a Tesco petrol station on your right and then at the traffic lights turn left into Grand Central Avenue (B4557). The stadium is at the end of this road.

I would recommend parking at one of the tube stations at the end of the Metropolitan Line such as Uxbridge, Hillingdon and Ruislip from the West and North, or at Stanmore on the Jubilee Line from the East and then take the tube to Wembley Park.

Public Transport

For those taken the plane the journey although Wembley Central is slightly further away from the stadium and has both rail & underground connections.

From the North train to **Banbury Railway Station** and then take the Chiltern railway train to **Wembley Railway Station** and turn right out of the station and it's a seven minutes' walk to the ground







Take the Metropolitan Line for **Wembley Park Underground Station** from there turn left on Bridge Road then first left and walk up to the ground.
