Ground Guide

After the Hillsborough Disaster in Sheffield three quarters of the ground was rebuilt in the mid 90's. One large two-tiered tiered stand, incorporating the Tilton Road End and the old Spion Kop end, completely surrounds half the pitch and replaced a former huge Spion Kop terrace.



Spion Kop End

The new Tilton Road End was opened in 1995, with the new Spion Kop following in 1996. At the back of the Spion Kop Stand, which runs along one side of the pitch, are a row of executive boxes, as well as a central seated executive area which also incorporates the Directors 'box'.

The Railway End, recently renamed Gil Merrick Stand their appearances record holder of 551 between 1946 to 1960 was opened in February 1999. It is a large two-tiered stand and unusual in having quite a small top tier, which overhangs the lower area. Again, there is a row of executive boxes in this stand, housed at the back of the lower section.

Away supporters are seated in the Gil Merrick Stand, in the section closest to the Spion Kop. Approximately a quarter to a half of the Lower Tier is reserved for away fans although for games when the away allocation is increased to 10% of the total capacity, the section extends down towards all but the last section of the lower tier. When coming to the ground

you'll come to the away turnstiles first when walking up from the city centre. The quality of the seating and views of the game from the Gil Merrick Stand are both excellent, though there can be a problem with legroom in parts. And the top tier is smaller than the lower tier.

Pubs for away fans and neutrals are in the centre of town near New Street Station are the Briar Rose which is at 25 Bennett's Hill good food and friendly staff. Near St Andrews is the Cricketers Arms at 48 Little Green Lane it is vibrant and sociable pub popular with locals and visitors alike. Nearby to Birmingham New Street just off the ramp is The Shakespeare Victorian Pub and the Sun on The Hill which both stock a decent choice of real ales. Nearby to Snow Hill Station there is the Old Contemptible which is an Oak Bar, or the Jekyll & Hyde, the gin parlour which also stocks a variety of real ales.

Food on offer inside the ground includes a range of Pies; Steak and Ale, Chicken & Mushroom (all £3), Burger/Cheeseburgers (£3.50), and Hot Dogs (£3.50) and there are good portions and £4.00 a pint. Me I am not for paying those prices so take a Subway Meal from Birmingham New Street or walk over to Pauls or Sixteen Bakery only 160 yards from the station to get hot pies for £1.00.



Main Stand

The former Main Stand, which was opened in 1952, now the only part that remains of the former St Andrews Ground. This is a two-tier stand running along one side of the pitch and has a row of executive boxes running across its middle and is stand is the smallest at the stadium.

This stand which is now known as the Garrison Lane Stand also houses the press area, television gantry and has the team dugouts located in front of it. The team dressing rooms are now situated within the Gil Merrick Stand, which results in the teams entering the field of play from one corner of the stadium between this stand and the Garrison Lane Stand and there is also in this area a large video screen that was erected in 2009.

Driving to the Ground



North/ South East

Leave the M6 at Junction 6 and take the A38 (M) the Aston Expressway for the City Centre. Continue past the first turn off and then take the next turn off, for the Inner Ring Road (Dartmouth Middleway).

Turn left at the roundabout at the top of the slip road and take the Ring Road East (Signposted Coventry/Stratford). Continue along the ring road for two miles, crossing straight across three roundabouts. At the fourth roundabout (there is a large McDonalds on the farleft hand corner) turn left into Coventry Road going towards Small Heath. Take a left into Cattell Road at the lights and City's ground is on your left. The ground is well sign posted on the Inner Ring Road. There is though plenty of street parking off the left-hand side of the ring road. Either around the small park at the third roundabout you cross or along the road next to and behind the BP garage before the fourth island. Bear in mind that if you arrive after 1.30pm these areas are likely to be already full. There are some local schools and firms that offer parking facilities for around £5. You can park next to the Cricketers Arms in Little Green Lane which is just of Cattell Road via Arsenal Street



South West

Take the M5 to junction 3 then take the A456 exit to Birmingham (W & C) then at the roundabout take the third exit onto Quinton Expressway/A456, go through two roundabouts and follow the signs for the A456 on the Middleway and follow this road for about five miles then take the left and follow the signs for Ring Road/ A38. At the roundabout take the third exit into Highgate Middleway and go straight on at one roundabout at the next take the third exit into Coventry Road then at the lights take a left into Cattell Road.

Train to **Birmingham New Street Railway Station** to walk out onto Smallbrook Queensway and then cross over the road to Moor Street Railway and take a right and walk down Selfridges Stop MS18 and take the **National Express West Midlands 17 bus** from to Coventry Road (St Andrews Stop) and it's a three minutes' walk to the ground.

Ground Guide

The ground is quite impressive, having had three new large stands Jack Walker, Blackburn End, and Darwen End built during the 1990's. These stands are at both ends and at one side of the ground. They are of similar design, being two tiered, having a row of executive boxes and similar roofs. The ends are particularly impressive, both having large lower tiers. The only downside is the open corners, although there is a huge screen at one corner by the away end.

There is also an electric scoreboard at the Darwen End of the ground now renamed Bryan Douglas Stand and this is where the away fans are housed where the facilities provided are good but the spacing between the rows of seats being quite tight (designed for a midget). The Darwen End is shared with home supporters, but if demand requires it the whole of the stand can be made available with 4,000 tickets, which are split between the whole of the upper tier and part of the lower tier (with the lower tier being allocated first).



Ronnie Clayton, Jack Walker and Riverside Stands (Paul Coleman)

The Riverside is the only undeveloped stand, running down one side of the pitch. This is a smaller single tiered stand and in fact it looks older than what it is having been opened in 1988. It contains a fair number of supporting pillars and is partly covered (to the rear) but has a huge walk way when leaving the ground and can watch the end of the match as you are leaving. Outside the stadium behind the Blackburn End there is a statue of former club owner Jack Walker.

Away fans are housed in the Bryan Douglas Darwen End, where the facilities provided are good. However, the spacing between the rows of seats leaves a lot to be desired, being quite tight. The Darwen End is shared with home supporters, but if the support demands require it the whole of the stand can be made available.



Bryan Douglas Stand

Normally the away allocation is for three quarters of the stand, at just under 4,000 tickets, which are split between the whole of the upper tier and part of the lower tier (with the lower tier being allocated first). If forgot to buy in advance, then you need to buy one from the away supporter's ticket office at the ground as you can't pay on the turnstiles. The ticket office is located on the corner of the Darwen End & the Jack Walker Stand.

The Fernhurst Lodge which is on Bolton Road where there is good food for price and are only two minutes from the stadium. Failing this you have The Golden Cup which is located quite a bit further along this road near to the M65. Mostly uphill, it is the most pleasant of walks, and unless you have a car or have just exited off of the M65 then you good selection of beers

There is also Uncle Jacks on Branch Road and it welcomes away fans, has an excellent selection of beers, cask ales as well as some brilliant pies and it is only a fourteen mins walk from the ground' you walk past the ground and then take a left down Branch Road. There is a large Weatherspoon's outlet near to Blackburn Railway Station known as the Postal Order, amongst a handful of other small watering holes which allow away and Neutral fans.

Food on offer inside the ground includes a range of Pies; Steak and Ale, Chicken & Mushroom (all £3), Burger/Cheeseburgers (£3.50), and Hot Dogs (£3.50) and there are good portions and £4.00 a pint. Me I am not for paying those prices so take a Subway Meal from Blackburn Railway Station or walk six minutes over to Oddies in New Market Street or Pounds Bakery at 8 New Market Street to get hot pies for £1.50

Driving to the Ground





Travel the M6 to junction 30, and merge onto the M61 then at leave junction 9 then onto the M65 towards Blackburn, then leave the M65 at Junction 4 (A666) and follow signs towards Darwen/ Blackburn. At the roundabout take the fourth exit into Earcroft Way and take a right at the lights and go under the M65 past the Fernhurst Lodge Pub then take the third right into the ground.

South



Travel the M6 to junction 29, then onto the M65 towards Blackburn, then leave the M65 at Junction 4 (A666) and follow signs above

East



Use Motorway M62 onto M66/A56, then onto the M65, head towards Blackburn then leave the M65 at Junction 4 (A666) and at the roundabout take the first exit into Earcroft Way and then follow the above directions for the North.

Public Transport/Walking

Take the train to **Blackburn Railway Station** walk three minutes up to the town centre and from stance 1 and get the **Blackburn Bus Company 1 Bus** and alight at Heys Lane then walk down past the Brown Cow Pub and continue to the main roundabout (Shearers Island) go straight on around McDonald and the ground is on the left.

Ground Guide

The Atyeo stand named after Peter John Walter Atyeo there highest scoring and appearances till the most appearances record was taken by Lois Carey in 2013 at one end of the ground, covered all seated single tiered stand. It was opened in 1994, replacing a former open terrace and has made a great difference to the overall look of the ground.



Other parts Ashton Gate Stadium have undergone major transformation recently with the building of two new stands and the refurbishment of a third. The most recent and largest edition is the new Lansdown Stand on the West side of the ground. Opened in August 2016 this huge stand has a capacity of around 11,000, spread over two tiers.

It has a large lower tier, with a smaller one above, whilst in-between the tiers there is a row of corporate boxes stretching across its middle. The stand has quite a high roof with a strip of Perspex running across the top of the upper tier just below, to allow more light to get to the pitch.



Updated Main Stand

At one end is another new stand. The South Stand was opened in August 2015 and has replaced the former Wedlock End. This new South Stand is a good sized single tiered stand, having a capacity of just over 6,000 seats. It extends around both corners of this end of the stadium. It has Perspex panels built into the front of the roof like all the new stands, to allow more sunlight onto the playing surface allowing the grass to grow naturally.



South Stand

On the remaining side is the Dolman Stand which was opened in 1970. It is a two-tiered all seated stand that has a large upper tier and a smaller lower tier. As part of the development works at the ground, its roof was further extended to meet the new stand in the South East corner and the stand itself was refurbished. Ashton Gate Stadium is shared with Bristol Rugby Club.

Fans who visit Ashton Gate are housed at one end of the stadium in the John Atyeo Stand, where around 4,200 fans can be accommodated. The stand is free of supporting pillars and offers good views of the playing action. The stand is also located quite close to the pitch and with good stand acoustics a good atmosphere can be created. Entrance to the ground is gained through the use of electronic turnstiles, whereby your ticket needs to be inserted into a bar code reader.

Alcohol is made available to away fans inside the ground with Brands available include; Heineken (£4.50), Fosters (£4), John Smiths (£4), Butcombe Bitter (£4), Guinness (£4.50) and Thatcher's Cider (£4). The Knights Templar pub, at 1 the Square it's a two minute walk straight ahead from the station into the Temple area and off to the left in the square'. Good beer food and wine served by friendly staff.

The Cottage in Baltic Wharf on Cumberland Road is a nice pub situated on the river front and has good real ale (from the Butcombe Brewery). The 'Tobacco House' bar which is five minutes' walk from the road behind the John Atyeo Stand next door to an Aldi store and the Tobacco House on Raleigh Road I found the bar friendly and trouble free and the food was good too.' The Orchard pub is about a ten minutes' walk from the ground at Hanover Place on Harbour side this pub is listed in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide and apart from having a number of Ale's on offer; it also has up to 24 different ciders available. Visiting supporters are welcome at the Bedminster Cricket Club, which is located about a 15 minutes' walk away from Ashton Gate, on Clanage Road and you can also park at a cost of £5 per car.'

Driving to the Ground



Exit the M5 at junction 15 merge onto the M4 to junction 19, exit toward A4174/Ring Road and then onto the M32 then continue on till you get to Cabot Circus take a left into Temple Way then at the main roundabout take the second exit into Temple Gate/ A4 and at the next roundabout take the third exit into Clarence Road and pass the Peugeot Garage then at the T Junction take a left and after crossing the bridge take the right exit and follow the signs for the A370 and after the lights take a left into Coronation Road.

Then after a mile take the first left after the cafe at the pedestrian crossing into Green Bush Lane then at the bottom of the road at the T Junction take a left into North Road and follow the road round as there is little parking at the ground, I take the third left into Bath Street and park at the flats and then walk it to the ground.



The Alternative route is to Leave the M5 at Junction 18 and travel along the Portway (A4) following signs for the Bristol Airport/Taunton (A38). As you go over the swing bridge (Brunel Way), branch left into Winterstoke Road, and you will see the ground on your left behind the houses and at the roundabout take the first exit up to the ground.

Take the train to **Bristol Temple Meads Rail Station** from outside Temple Meads Railway Station main entrance walk over to the bus stop and take the **First Bus Airport Flyer X1** to Redcliffe Road and walk to Stop 3 and the take the **First Bus 24 Citylines bus** to Dunford Street then walk back down to Ashton Road then take a left and the entrance is on the left down the lane

Ground Guide

After 99 years the club have left Ninian Park and moved to a new stadium, which is situated only around 400yards away. The new stadium and has great facilities for the fans. All four stands are of the same height and the stadium is completely enclosed with all four corners having spectator seating. Three sides of the stadium are identical, all being single tiered, all seating affairs.

The roofs above these stands are situated quite high above the seating areas, with a large back wall, part of which contains Perspex panels to provide more light for the playing surface. The Grandstand is a little different, having a second tier of seating that overlaps the back of the lower tier. In this area at the rear of the lower section there is a row of executive boxes. Whilst at the back of the second tier there is visible a glassed frontage to and area used for corporate entertainment. Above each end there is digital video screen and they share the stadium is shared with Cardiff Blues Rugby Union team.

The catering on the concourses are spacious, have televisions to keep you entertained and serve the usual fayre of food, including various Pies; Steak and Ale, Chicken Curry, Veggie (all £3.90), Hot Dogs (£4.30) and Cheeseburgers (£4.50).

If you walk from Cardiff Main Station up to the Castle on Castle Street good food for those non-vegans at Nata and co or for the Vegans the Vegan Pie Shop or turn left in front of the castle up to the Y junction turn right into Cowbridge Road and get some pies from Bruntos Bakers on Lower Canton these three bakeries will save you a fortune in food.



Ninian Stand

The town centre is your best bet for getting a few drinks before the game. However, if you're an away fan be sure to keep colours covered as there's very rarely any visiting supporters friendly pubs and there are a few pubs around the ground such as The Ninian Park but even without any away fan strings attached you're advised to seek a beer a little further away and so The Yard Bar and Kitchen 42-43, Brewery Quarter St Mary Street is three minutes' walk down St Marys Street while the Gatekeeper at 9, Westgate Street is across from Cardiff Arms Park and Millennium Stadium both a friendly and good food before going on to the match.

Driving to the Ground



Exit the M4 at Junction 33, and join the A4232 following the signs for Cardiff. Leave the A4232 at the second exit. Keep in the left-hand lane, as this joins Leckwith Road and follow Leckwith Road to the traffic lights and then turn right into Sloper Road. The ground is on your left.

Parking is freely available at the stadium providing you arrive in good time. Street parking also exists in the surrounding streets. However, train and bus services are very frequent and reliable and allow easy access to and from the ground.

Public Transport







 \rightarrow 5 mins

Take the train to **Cardiff Central Railway Station** then change to Aviva Train Wales to **Ninian Park Halt Railway Station**, which is only a five minutes' walk from the stadium and this station is on a local line (city line-direction Radyr) which is served by trains from Cardiff Central (every thirty minutes) on leaving Ninian Park Halt station walk along Leckwith Road and you will see the stadium over on your left.

Alternatively go to main line station Cardiff Central, it's an 18-minute walk to the ground, as you come out of the entrance to the station walk through Station Square, bear left in to Wood Street and at the bottom go on through to Tudor Street. Continue straight on into Ninian Park Road, for around a mile passing the Millennium Stadium on your right. At the end of Ninian Park Road turn left and then left into Leckwith Road and the ground is on your left.

Ground Guide

The new Coventry stadium is functional and fairly conservative in its design. Three sides of the stadium, which are large single tiered stands and within the complex has an exhibition centre attached to its West side, resulting in a unique looking stand that gives more of a continental feel.



South & East Stand

The Lloyds Pharmacy Stand, it has a small tier of seats overhanging the larger lower tier, with a row of corporate hospitality boxes, running along the back of the lower section. Along the top of the stand is a large area of white panelling (adorned with the logo of the stadium sponsors) that runs along the length of the stand and around the corners of either side of it. In one of these corners is located a Police Control box. Below the white panelling is a large windowed corporate hospitality area.



South, West and North Stands

The stadium is fully enclosed with all corners of the stadium being filled with spectator seating and all the stands are of the same height, giving it a symmetrical look. There a number of clear Perspex panels located in the roof at the South end of the stadium, plus a large strip of Perspex that runs around the stadium just below the roof at the back of three sides. These measures allow more natural light to enter the stadium, which helps the growth of the grass pitch. There is also a large video screen type scoreboard located in one corner of the stadium between the South and East Stands.

Seating for away supporters is normally allocated within Blocks 6 and 7 of the south stand, although if there is greater demand for seats this is extended to sections 8 and 9 as per the above diagram. One estimate suggest that the away allocation is anywhere between 2,500-4,000 seats and entrance to the stadium is through automatic turnstiles, where you have to put your ticket (which has a bar code on it) into a slot reader, which then allows the turnstiles admit you.

Behind the stands there are spacious concourses and a number of food and drink outlets. Food on offer includes; Steak Pie (£3.50), Chicken Curry Pie (£3.50), Cheese and Onion Pie (£3.50) and Sausage Rolls (£3) and the concourses also have a number of televisions which show the game being played inside.

Driving to the Ground



North/ South East

Leave the M6 at Junction 3 and then take the A444 towards the city centre. You'll find the stadium on the left after about a mile.

Parking at the stadium is mostly for permit holders, although the Club do sell on the day spaces in Car Park C at £10 per car, although it is best to book a space in advance. Blue badge holders can also park at the stadium itself but again at a cost of £10. The Club are also utilising a number of car parks within walking distance of the stadium, in such places as

factory units and local schools, costs of these official car parks varies but are around £2.50-£5 per vehicle.

The club moved 400 yards across the river in 1994 after leaving their former Leeds Road Ground, their home for 86 years. When the stadium originally opened it had just three sides with the North Stand being opened later in 1997 and can accommodate up to 24,500!

In 2004 it was renamed the Galpharm Stadium, before becoming the John Smith's Stadium in 2012, in a new five-year sponsorship deal with Heineken. Each stand is semi-circular rather than rectangular, and is further enhanced with large white steel tubing above

the contours. The ground has won many design awards and is well worth a visit with the corners of the ground are open the wind can blow through in winter and the mountings for the stand should have been put outside so at some time in the future the ground could be fully enclosed.

The Media North Stand at one end and the Riverside Stand at one side are both two tiered stands, each with a row of executive boxes running across the middle. The other two sides of the ground are large single tiered affairs. One of these the Britannia Rescue Stand, at one side of the pitch, can accommodate 7,000 supporters. There is an electric scoreboard at the back of the away end in the South End of the ground known as the Pink Lane Stand which can accommodate up to 4,000 away fans with the stadium is shared with Huddersfield Giants Rugby League Club.



South Stand

Food on offer inside the stadium includes; Cheeseburgers (£3.50), Hamburgers (£3.20), Hot Dogs (£3.20), Peppered Steak Pie (£3.50), Meat and Potato Pie (£3.50), Chicken Balti Pie (£3.50), Cheese and Onion Pie (£3.50) and Sausage Rolls (£3). But go the Pound bakery at 60 New Street the pies are cheaper and for a good coffee go Coffee revolution at 8 Church Street you will save money for drinks.

Turn either into Bradley Mills Road and then right into Kilner Road or take the following left into St Andrews Way and left into Stadium Way.



South from M1

Ground Guide

The Club moved to the KC Stadium in December 2002 and sharing with Hull RFC after leaving their former Boothferry Park home where they had been resident since 1946 and were the easiest to get to by train as the old station was outside the park.

Built in a parkland setting only 200 yards from their very first ground Anlady Cricket Ground, the stadium is totally enclosed and only 100 yards from their original Anlady Road Cricket Ground, with the West Stand being around twice the size of the other three sides. Apart from the West Stand, each of the other three stands is single tiered. The West Stand also benefits from having a row of executive boxes running across its middle. There is a large video screen at the North End of the stadium and the P.A system within the stadium is also excellent.



All four stands

Away fans who visit the KC Arena are housed within the north-east corner of the stadium, something which is made possible by the bowl-shaped nature of Hull's modern stadium. The allocation by default sits at around 1,300 tickets for the visiting team, however if there proves to be greater demand the club essentially double the figure to 2,600. The concourse is well-sized which reduces the half-time stampede, and snacks and beverages are served efficiently and this makes the experiences of any fan's visit much more positive.

At the end of the M62, and continue onto the A63 towards Hull. Stay on the A63 and take the exit for Beverley/A164. At the roundabout take the third exit for Beverley/ Humber Bridge/ York and go on through three roundabouts and at the fourth take the second exit (Signposted City Centre/ Hull Royal Infirmary) and then turn left at the lights and then over the flyover, right at the next lights and the ground is down on the right.

The Sir Alf Ramsey Stand and the Sir Bobby Robson Stand, are similar in appearance and size, and dwarf the older stands, located on each side of the ground. Unusually, both ends have a larger upper tier which overhangs slightly the smaller lower tier. Both have windshields to either side of the upper tier opened a year apart in 2001 & 2002.

On one side, the West Stand (East of England Co-operative Stand Stand) which is a three-tier covered stand, with a row of executive boxes running across its middle. This stand was originally opened in 1957.



Sir Alf Ramsey Stand (South Stand)

The teams emerge onto the field from one corner of the ground between the Sir Alf Ramsey and Britannia Stands. Outside are two statues of two former lpswich and England managers. One is of World Cup winner Sir Alf Ramsey and is located on the corner between the Cobbold and Sir Bobby Robson Stand, while Sir Bobby Robson's statue is placed behind the Cobbold stand in Portman Road.

Away fans that make the trip to Ipswich's ground are housed within the revamped Cobbold Stand in respect of the Cobbold family who were former owners of the club and old Suffolk brewers Tolly-Cobbold which runs for the length of the pitch on the eastern side along Portman Road. Consisting of two unevenly split tiers, visiting supporters occupy the larger section of the stand within the second tier which is capable of seating 1,900.

Shared with some sections of the home faithful, the Cobbold Stand's age manifests itself in a number of ways, most notably in the relative lack of leg room within each row of seats compared to some of the newer grounds. The dates would suggest that it was once former terracing and even with support pillars, views for the majority of fans remain unobstructed.

Food on offer inside the ground include; Rollover Hot Dogs (£3.30), Various Pies & Pasties (£3), including the tasty Portman Steak & Ale Pie (£3.50) and Jumbo Sausage Rolls (£3). They also offer a Pie & Pint/Drink deal.'



Exit from the A14 at the A12 Colchester junction. Follow the A1214 into Ipswich. You will go over two roundabouts, and several sets of traffic lights. When you get to the large set of lights, at the end of London Road, then you need to get into the middle lane, and go straight over the lights. At the next set of lights (beware these two sets of lights are only about 100 yards apart), then turn right into West End Road, past the BMW garage. Continue along West End Road for about a mile, and then turn first left into 'Sir Alf Ramsey Way just after the bridge. Continue along 'Sir Alf Ramsey Way' for about 300 yards, and the ground is on your right.

The ground is dominated by the East Stand on one side of the stadium. This stand which holds around 17,000 supporters was opened in the 1992-93 season, and is at least twice the size of the other three stands at Elland Road. The Away fans are housed up to 5,000 between this stand and the South Stand

The East Stand is a two tier stand which has a large lower tier of seating with a smaller tier above. In-between the two tiers are a row of executive boxes. The stand is completed by a large imposing roof. The rest of the stadium is that it is totally enclosed, with the corners of the ground being filled with seating.

All the remaining stands have a number of supporting pillars and at the back of the West Stand (which was renamed in March 2004, the 'John Charles Stand' in honour of their former great player), the stand was first opened in 1957. This stand also houses the team dugouts and television gantry. There is an electric scoreboard in one corner of the ground between the South & John Charles Stands. Outside the stadium there are statues of Billy Bremner and Don Revie.

Take the M62 to Junction 27 and then follow signs for the M621. Join the M621 and after one and a half miles leave the motorway at the junction 2 with the A643. In August 2002 the club moved 400 yards away across the cricket ground from their <u>Filbert Street</u> ground into its new home and the stadium is completely enclosed with all corners being filled with seating. The sides are of a good size, built in the same style and height.



King Power inside with all four stands

The Upton Steel West Stand though on one side of the pitch does contain a row of executive boxes. Running around three sides of the stadium, just below the roof, is a transparent Perspex strip, which allows lighter and facilitates pitch growth. There are also two large video screens located in opposite corners of the stadium. Unusually the public address system is also broadcast on the speakers around the outside of the stadium. The King Power Stadium does have one redeeming feature - atmosphere. The acoustics are very good and both sets of supporters can really make some noise, making a great atmosphere.

The away fans are accommodated up to 5000 in between the Family Stand and the East Stand in the corner so they are surrounded on both sides by the home where banter flows thought the game. The food on the concourse is priced Double Cheeseburgers (£6.20), Cheeseburgers (£4.50), Hot Dogs (£4.50), a range of Pies (Chicken Balti, Steak and Ale, Monthly Guest Pie all (£4.20), Sausage Rolls with Leicester Cheese (£4) and Broccoli, Cauliflower and Double Cheese Pie (£4.20). You are better getting food outside like coffee from the Pumpkin Café at the station and your pies at Bakery or Bread and Honey in Kings Street

Take the M1 until junction 22 or A46/A607 into Leicester city centre. Follow signs to Rugby Ground into Almond Road, and then turn right into Ayleston Road. Swing a left into Walnut Street, and then turn left into Filbert Street.



South

Take the M1 of M69 until junction 21, then A46 (Signposted Leicester). Go under the railway bridge and turn right into Upperton Road and right again into Filbert Street.



Take the M69 or A50 into Leicester city centre. Follow signs to Rugby into Almond Road,

and then turn into Ayleston Road. Swing a left into Walnut Street, then left into Filbert Street.



East

Take the A47 into Leicester city centre. Follow signs to Rugby into Almond Road, and then turn into Ayleston Road. Swing a left into Walnut Street, then left into Filbert Street. If Tigers are not playing at home then park at Leicester Rugby Club which cost £3 in Almond Street which is a ten-minute walk away from the stadium. If they are at home then park plenty of street parking around the Upperton Road area and on streets running off the A5460 by the railway bridge.

Allow yourself a little extra time to get to the ground as traffic does tend to get quite congested near the stadium and recently a number of 'Residents Only Parking' schemes have been implemented on streets off the A5460 Narborough Road and Upperton Road, near to the ground, which means that street parking now has to be found further away from the stadium.

You can park on side streets off Narborough Road but located around Imperial Road beside the church or on Fosse Road South, (if approaching from J21 of the M1) but this may then mean a 26-minute walk to the King Power Stadium. You walk down to the Baptist Church then turn right into Upperton Road cross the River Scar and turn right and walk down to the Stadium.

The Club moved from its former home of Ayresome Park where it had played since 1903 to the Riverside Stadium in 1995. The stadium is totally enclosed, after the previous open corners to either side of the West Stand were closed with seating in 1998. All the stands are two-tiered, although the West Stand is slightly larger than the other three sides.



This stand also has a row of executive boxes running across its middle and the roof around the stadium is raised up above the seating areas to allow more light to get to the pitch,

through Perspex panels located between the roof and the back of the seating areas. There is also a large video screen situated in the South East corner.

Away supporters are housed on one side of the East Stand (towards the South East corner) at one side of the stadium and just under 3,000 fans can be accommodated in this area. The turnstiles are electronic which means that you have to insert your ticket in a reader, to gain entry. The away turnstiles are numbered 53-61 and then there is the regular fayre of food; Cheeseburgers (£3.80), Burgers (£3.50), Hot Dogs (£3.50), Pizza (£3), Chicken Balti Pies (£3), Cheese & Onion Pasties (£3) and Minced Beef Pies (£3). If you head over to the local shopping Centre then go to Copelands their selection of food and bakery are the cheapest in the town and get you coffee from Muffins in the Centre.



West and North Stands

Outside the main entrance you will find a pair of statues dedicated to two former Boro greats; George Hardwick & Wilf Mannion. In between the statues are the old entrance gates to Ayresome Park and are a reminder of the old ground.

From the A1/M1 you should follow the A66 (signposted Darlington/ Teesside A66/ M66) follow this past Darlington and on into Middlesbrough. The Club moved the relatively short distance to then was called the New Den after leaving their original Den ground which was their home for 83 years. This was first new major football ground to be constructed in London since before the Second World War. The stadium is made up of four separate two-tiered stands that are of the same height and look fairly similar. On one side is the Barry Kitchener Stand (named after a former player) which has the players tunnel and team dugouts at its front.

This simple looking stand has the same characteristics as both ends with windshields to either side in the upper tier and with the upper tier slightly overhanging the lower tier. The Dockers Stand on the other side is slightly different having a row of executive boxes running across its middle. Between the East & North Stands in one corner is a large video screen.

Away fans are located at one end of the ground in the North Stand (usually in the upper tier only). Around 4,000 away fans can be accommodated in this end. The food is the usual assortment of Steak & Ale and Chicken Balti (£3.50). There are also Cheese & Onion Pasties (£3.50), Sausage Rolls (£3.10), Burgers (£4) and Chips (£2.10).

To save you waiting in the long ques get your food at either London Bridge or if you coming through Strafford International there is plenty of grub around there and for those who wish a drink before the game then there really aren't any pubs around Millwall's Den according to local listings, and any which are, are unlikely to be suitable for visiting supporters. This means that traveling supporters have the option of either drinking exclusively inside the stadium or going for a few beverages at London Bridge Station which is where the connecting train is for most fans.



West Stand

A pub with a bit of character is The Shipwrights Arms at 88 Tooley Street next to London Bridge which boasts of having an "original shipwrights' mural", with the 17th century George Inn 77 Borough High street and as is The Slug and Lettuce chain pub both of which are on 34 Borough High Street which is 500 yards away from London bridge station.



Also, at 8 Borough High Street is the Barrow Boy & Banker, which is a Fullers pub and further down the High Street on nearby Stoney Street is situated the legendary Market Porter pub. This pub is on the listing in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide and always has real ales on tap.

The ground has been steadily redeveloped since the late 1970's, with all four sides of the ground having either two or single tier new stands. The newest of these is the Jarrold (South Stand) at one side of the pitch which was opened in 2004. It is an impressive looking single tier, all seated stand that can house up to 8,000 supporters.



Jarrold Stand

It is unusual in having not one, but three separate television gantries suspended beneath its Perspex roof. This stand was further extended in 2005 and now surrounds the corner of the ground where it joins the Norwich & Peterborough Stand, filling in the corner.

The first of these to be built was the River End in 1979, with the Barclay End opposite opening in 1992. On the remaining side is the Geoffrey Watling City Stand. Named after a former club president and opened in 1986, this single tiered stand is smaller than both ends and houses amongst other things the Directors Box and Press Area. This stand extends

around to meet the ends at both corners, giving the ground an enclosed look on that side. In one corner in-between, the Barclay End and Jarrold South Stand,

The stadium has the Holiday Inn Hotel at one end of the ground between the Jarrod and the Barclay inn. The corner in-fill between known as the Thorpe Lower tier between the Barclay Stand and the Geoffrey Watling City Stand is affectionately known to Norwich fans as the "Snake Pit!"

The rest of the ground is also all seated and all stands are covered. Both ends look particularly smart, being large two-tiered affairs, complete with a row of executive boxes and distinctive pairs of large floodlight pylons protruding from their roofs like the old days.

From the M11 Junction 27, exit onto M11 toward Stansted Airport/ Cambridge/ Harlow and follow the A11 toward Thetford/ Norwich the just before Norwich at Cantley Wood take the fourth exit onto the A47 and join the southern bypass and follow the above directions from here

Home Park was originally used by the now defunct Devonport Albion rugby team from 1893 to 1901 before Argyle moved in and since the 1990's ground has been updated but the Old Main Stand still remains for now.




New Main Stand

The Home Park pitch is surrounded by four covered all-seater stands, officially known as the Mayflower Grandstand to the south, Devonport End to the west, Lyndhurst Stand to the north, and Barn Park End to the east. Each stand has one tier with the exception of the Mayflower Grandstand which has two, an upper tier and a lower tier, known as the Mayflower Terrace, which was converted from terracing in 2007.



Devonport Stand (Doing the 116)

The Mayflower Grandstand is the club's main stand, which can hold roughly 7,000 spectators. It was the oldest part of the ground, before being replaced by a new main stand. It houses the club's main offices, the boardroom, team changing rooms, press rooms and also accommodates executive boxes, which can host functions and are available to supporters during match days. The dugouts; which are made of wood and supplied by the club's sponsors; sit in front of the Mayflower, with the player tunnel slightly off centre going underneath the Mayflower.



Barn Park End (Doing the 116)

To the rear of the stand is the Club Shop, selling official merchandise, and the Pyramid Suite, a top-class hospitality area which can cater for up to 170 people. There are two structures overlooking the pitch on each side of the stand. To the east is a building which contains a hospitality area (the Chisholm Lounge), and a press area, and to the west is a disabled enclosure. There have been plans to replace this stand for a number of years. In 2013, planning permission was finally given to revamp and rebuild the Mayflower Grandstand after becoming less popular with supporters and the club's chairman James Brent, although no date has ever been set for the construction to begin.

The other three stands are very similar in design and linked together, having been built in 2001. The Devonport End is the traditional end where the more vocal of the club's supporters gather. It can hold approximately 3,500 spectators.



Lyndhurst Stand Doing the 116

The Lyndhurst Stand is the largest of the three, holding approximately 6,000 spectators, including the corners. The corner towards the East side of the ground is now the dedicated family area. The Barn Park End is where the away supporters are housed. Similar to the Devonport End, it also holds approximately 3,500 spectators. The standard allocation given to visiting clubs is 1,300 but this can be increased if demand requires it. All three boast good views and standard facilities for a football stadium, concourses, merchandise stands and food and drink outlets.

For away fans The Britannia Inn at 1 Wolseley Road is the one favoured by neutral and away fans because of its vast interior Excellent range of reasonably well-kept ales, cheap grub, the staff run a good ship and, in my opinion, this is one of the best Weatherspoon's in the country. To get there just walk down Pennycomequick Hill and instead of walking through the park walk straight on the arms are in front of you from the Britannia to the ground it's just a walk across the road walk up Outland Road and then take the first right into Mayflower Drive the ground is in front of you.

Take the M5 to the South West and at the end of the motorway continue onto the A38. Three sides of the stadium are composed of modern all seater stands, each has a likeness of a past player outlined on the seats and is named after that player. Tom Finney record all time goal scorer, Bill Shankly and goalkeeping legend and record appearance holder of 513 appearances for the club Alan Kelly, are all honoured and this is a nice touch for people who played and managed the club over the past 140 years

Old Deepdale was higgle to piggle of stands and enclosures that had been there since the beginning of the football club and after the Bradford, Hillsborough and Heysel disasters North End started to revamp the ground.



Main Stand

The first of these stands to be built was the Sir Tom Finney Stand in 1995. This was followed by the Bill Shankly Kop in 1998 and the Alan Kelly Stand in 2001 and complete and they are of the same height and style and are all large, covered, single tiered stands. Up to 6,000 away fans are accommodated in the Shankly Kop end of the ground and the club have a

good deal for away fans of £48 for two adults plus two under 16's saving a family £20 on the day.



The Invincuble Stands

The last new stand, the Invincible Stand (named after the legendary Preston team of 1888/1889 who went through the whole season unbeaten and were also the first in that season to win the League & FA Cup double and in the FA, Cup didn't lose a goal); this stand is slightly different to the other three. Even though it is of the same height and has a similar roof, it has a smaller tier of seating, with 22 executive boxes sitting above. But unlike the other stands has only PNE FC in the stand.

The stadium was the original location for the National Football Museum, which opened in 2001, recognising Deepdale's status as the world's oldest football league ground still in use However, in 2010 the museum was controversially closed, to be relocated to Urbis in Manchester, where it reopened in 2012. The move prompted Sir Tom Finney to withdraw his personal memorabilia from the museum in protest.



Allan Kelly Stand

Despite the museum's closure at Deepdale, the National Football Museum retained the long-term lease on its former site, which has since been used to store 90% of the museum's collection and as an "archive and research centre", but has otherwise remained vacant and closed to the public, despite periodic proposals to put the site to other uses.

Driving Directions



Leave M6 at Junction 31 from the North its third exit at the first roundabout then straight through the next roundabout on to Preston New Road/ A59 and from the South take the first exit at the roundabout onto the A59. Go up the hill (stick to 30 mph) and follow the road down to a mini roundabout and at the roundabout with the Hesketh Arms turn right into Blackpool Road. Go straight on over three sets of lights and just before a fourth set, the ground appears set slightly back on the left. Parking is mainly in the streets surrounding the ground.

Parking for cars is available for £3 a car at Moorfields Special School. Just follow the directions above and at the last set of traffic lights continue straight on for about 200 yards, and you will see the school on the left near Moor Park and is quicker for getting out of the ground after the match

Loftus Road has a tight compact feel, enclosed, with supporters being close to the pitch. An unusual aspect is that all four stands are roughly the same height, their roofs meet at all four corners with no gaps. The pre-1991's ground was open to the elements on three sides.



Ellerslie Stand (Dan 92)

The South Africa Road Stand on one side has a larger upper tier, compared to the lower tier, with a row of executive boxes running across the middle. There are a couple of supporting pillars in this stand. The other side, the Ellerslie Road Stand, is single tiered, with a television gantry suspended below its roof.



South Africa Stand (BEG)

On one of these, the School End where the away fans are situated in the upper tier of the stand, where around 2,500 fans can be accommodated. If demand requires it then the lower

tier can also be allocated. If the away club only takes the upper tier allocation, then the lower tier is allocated to home supporters. The entrance for away fans to the School End upper tier is now longer in South Africa Road, but on the opposite side of the ground in Ellerslie Road and there is a large video screen located on the centre of its roof.



Loftus Road Stand

Below this and situated between the lower and upper tier is a small electric scoreboard. The ground has a tremendous atmosphere. You are close to the pitch, close to the visiting fans and most importantly close to the action'. Another plus point was that the food is served within the ground was quite good and the service prompt. Entrance to the stadium is gained by inserting your ticket into a bar code reader.



The club moved out of there old ground of 101 years Milmoor and would spend four years at the now demolished at the Don Valley Stadium in Sheffield, before the Club have returned home to Rotherham in 2012. The new stadium, which cost in the region of £20m to build, is 200 yards North East to their old Millmoor Ground and 500 yards from their first ground as County next to Thornhill Primary School in Henley Road.

The area of Rotherham where the ground is located is historically known as New York (hence the stadium name) and is built on the site of the old Guest & Chrimes factory. The stadium from the outside looks far larger than its 12,000 capacity and is quite San Siro in Milan in its design. It is totally enclosed and all seated.

On one side is the Eric Twigg Foods Pukka Pies (West) Stand. This is the largest of the four single tiered stands. The stand has a middle-seated area of the stand which is situated at a lower level than either of the wings. There is an executive area above this with seating outside and yet further above is a television gantry, set into the red panelled wall. The other sides of the stadium are much smaller in size. Both ends are virtually identical, except that the Morrison's (South) Stand has a small electric scoreboard situated at the back of it.

The Ben Bennett (East) Stand, which is slightly less tall than both the ends. This stand has two large areas built into the front of the stand for the use of disabled supporters and they get a great view of the game.

Away fans are normally housed in the Morrison Stand at one end of the stadium, where around 2,500 supporters can be accommodated and tickets can be obtained at the Away ticket office in the Morrison Stand. On the roof of the East Stand are two futuristic looking floodlight pylons that are supplemented by a row of lights above the West Stand.



South & West Stands

For the away fans the Bluecoat pub at The Crofts are three hundred yards away from the station having visited before I knew that this is one of the better Weatherspoon where the staff seems to be fairly well clued up. Surprise, surprise, the Real Ale was served at a more ambient temperature and in decent condition, therefore much more acceptable. The only disappointment was that I thought the beers on offer were not as interesting however this obviously depends on personal taste.

The Bridge Inn, in Greasbrough Road, which is located quite close to the railway station turn right out of the station and then cross the bridge and the pub is across the road in front of you. This pub which is listed in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide serves beers from the Old Mill Brewery as well as guest beers and a real cider. This pub has a warm welcome for all fans

and it wasn't too bad to get served inside.

Alcohol is also available inside the stadium in the form of: Fosters, John Smiths (Both £3 a pint), Bulmer's (£3 a bottle), plus Red, White and Rose wines (£3.90 small bottle).

Driving Directions



From the North:

Don't use the postcode for sat nav use Main Street Rotherham. Leave the M1 at Junction 34 and take the fourth exit at the roundabout onto the A6178 towards Rotherham. At the third roundabout (Ickles Roundabout) take the first exit onto Centenary Way (Signposted Doncaster) cross over the bridge, you will see the stadium on your right and at the next roundabout (Masbrough roundabout) turn right onto Main Street and the entrance to the stadium is down on the right down New York Way.



From the South:

Leave the M1 at Junction 33 and take the third exit onto the A630 towards Rotherham. After a few yards at the next roundabout take the first exit and at the next take the second exit onto Centenary Way and go straight on at the next roundabout you will reach the stadium on your right and at the next roundabout (Masbrough roundabout) turn right onto Main Street and the entrance to the stadium is down on the right down New York Way. Car parking at the stadium is for permit holders only. However, there are a number of pay & display car parks located around the town centre. Otherwise there is some street parking available around the area of the old Millmoor ground, which is around a 10 minutes' walk away to the ground.

The ground has four large separate stands, all of which are all covered and are roughly the same height, giving a uniform feel to the stadium. On one side is the North Stand. This large single tiered stand was opened in 1961. It was the largest cantilever stand ever built in Britain and only the second such type of stand to have been constructed (the first was at the Old Showground in Scunthorpe).

The two-tiered South Stand on one side of the ground is the largest of the stands and is superb looking. It was originally opened in 1914 and was designed by the famous football ground architect Archibald Leitch. A second tier and new roof were added in 1996, to expand capacity for the European Championships, for which Hillsborough was a host venue. In keeping with the original look of the stand, a triangular gable incorporating a clock adorned with a copper football was placed on the new roof. The stand has a large lower tier with a small upper tier above. At the back of the lower tier is a row of executive boxes.



At one end is the Spion Kop (Hallam FM Kop) and this used to be a huge open bank of terrace that was at one time the largest in Britain. It gained a roof in 1986 and was made all seated in 1993. Opposite is the West Stand or Leppings Lane End. This two-tiered stand was opened in 1966, in time for the Club to host some World Cup games played that year. Like the Kop, it has a number of large supporting pillars where up to 8,000 away fans can be accommodated.



One corner of the ground is filled with seating between the North & West Stand, this area is uncovered. On the other side of the West Stand is an electric scoreboard, under which is tucked a Police Control Box. Unusually for such an old ground, it doesn't floodlight pylons with the stadium with lights running across the front of the stand roofs.

Outside the ground near the main entrance is a memorial to the 96 fans that died at Hillsborough on the 15 April 1989, at the FA Cup Semi Final Liverpool & Nottingham Forest

game which was abandoned after 6 minutes.



The club moved from The Dell which I have good memories with my dad back in the 1960's and had been there on numerous occasions so moving to the new St Mary's Stadium in 2001 was for me a bit sad seeing the old ground demolished and another Archibald Leitch design went to the archive with new houses built on it with the street being named after the ground. In some ways the club are only 500 yards from the clubs first ground on the Common (Hoglands Park Evan Street A33) in the Northam area of the town and the club was originally founded as 'Southampton St Marys' in 1885, hence the club nickname 'The Saints'.



All sides of the ground

The stadium is completely enclosed, with all corners being filled with seating and at least when they put the seating in the did not try to cram in as many seats as possible and give

you ample room for your legs unlike some other new grounds which were designed for midget legs or a person of the last century. Away fans are located in the Northam Stand at one end of the stadium, where normally up to 3,300 fans can sit. For cup games, this allocation can be increased to 4,750. The view of the playing action and the facilities within this stand are excellent. Leg room is good, although the width of the seating seemed to be a bit narrower than other grounds with executive's boxes in the Itcham Stand.

There are also two screens sitting on the roofs at each end. Running around three sides of the stadium, and on the remaining side there is a row of executive boxes. The crowd are set well back from the playing action, as firstly there is a cinder track surrounding the playing surface just like the old days (yeah, I am that old and ancient).

Best to get food around Southampton Station and cheaper and for the neutrals and away fans The King Alfred Public House 51 Northam Road is neutrals and away fans only and there is a very good selection of wines beer and food and is close to the ground. The Alternative is on Onslow Road at Rockstone pub, which has up to seven real ales. It also known for its large gourmet burgers! A five minutes' walk from the Rockstone is the Guide Dog pub on Earl's Road which has up to 11 real ales on tap. Both these pubs are listed in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide if you are into that ancient and new beers.

Driving Directions



From the M3 take Junction 14 and follow the A33 into Southampton. Continue on the A33 until you reach the junction with the A3024 Northam Road and turn left onto this road towards Northam. Then turn right onto Britannia Road for the stadium.

Like the old ground there is not a lot of parking in fact its non-existence for away or neutrals means you have to look for a place to park the car so I ignore the above directions and Park at the Ocean Village which costs £4.00 by taking the M27 to junction 7, signposted to Southampton and Bittern, follow the A334, which turns in to the A3024, continue over the bridge over the Solent. At the main junction with traffic lights, turn left on to Kingsway/St Mary's Place marked "Docks" then continue past the park on your right and then the road bends round to the left into a one-way system. Stay in the righthand lane and do not take the left hand turning to go over the bridge, continue straight over the next set of traffic lights, marked "Docks".

At the end of this road, turn immediately left at the next junction (signed Ocean Village and Woolston) then follow the road over the train tracks/crossing and go straight over the first set of traffic lights and turn right at the second set of traffic lights into Ocean Way the main entrance to Ocean Village

The road goes past a Tesco Express on the left and the Cineworld cinema on the right before bending round to the right with parking is available either in the surface car park straight ahead or in the new multi-storey Ocean Car Park then it's a 14 minute walk to the ground you just walk up Bridle Place to the end turn right onto Marine Parade and the

ground is on the left and parking here means you miss out on the grid lock and are home a lot earlier.

The Club moved to the Britannia Stadium 1997, after playing for 119 years at their old

Victoria Ground which had been the original ground as Stoke Ramblers when it had been Victoria Cricket Ground in 1862 and you walk past this piece land to get to the ground.

The largest of these is the Q-railing (West) Stand, which is the tallest at the Britannia. This imposing stand has a large lower tier of seating with a smaller tier above. Situated between the tiers is a row of Executive Boxes. There are quite large open areas with the Marston's Pedigree (South) Stand at one end of the stadium which is partly given to away supporters and covered, with windshields to either side. It is though quite steep, meaning that fans are kept close to the playing action. The teams come onto the pitch from one corner of the ground, between the Marston's Pedigree (South) Stand and the Q-railing (West) Stand. In the corner on the other side of the Marston's Pedigree (South) Stand and East Stand is a large video screen which blocks out the old free view.

At the Boothen End there are three statues of the legendary former player Sir Stanley Matthews, which were originally unveiled by Kevin Keegan'. The club also have a couple of unusual looking mascots, with a blue coloured hippo called 'Pottermus' and his white girlfriend 'Pottermiss' as bad as Man City and MK Dons.



South & East Ends

The stadium can be seen from afar, as it is perched upon a hill with hardly any buildings around it. It especially looks good at night when it is lit up. The ground has one large single stand, incorporating the Boothen End and Seddon Stands, completely surrounds half the pitch as it extends around one corner. Whilst the other two stands South and West Stands on the other sides are 'free standing' having open corners to either side.



The Club moved from their former home of Roker Park where they had played for 99 years to the Stadium of Light in 1997, on the site of the former Wearmouth Colliery their club placed behind the West Stand there is a large red wheel, an emblem of the lifts that used to take the miners down to the coal face.

The stadium is of a good size, is totally enclosed and on the whole is quite impressive. It is composed of two three tiered stands at the North end and the West side of the ground, whilst the others are two tiered. The West (Main) Stand on one side also has a row of executive boxes (which you can sit outside if you wish), that are situated just below the top tier. Currently the away section is in the South Stand where 7000 fans can be accommodated.

However, if at some point the Club were to add an additional tier to the two remaining sides, then an even more remarkable stadium would emerge. There is also a large electronic scoreboard perched upon the roof at either end.

The PA system deafening especially when the classical piece of music is played before the players come on to the pitch at the start of the game and U2's 'Elevation', as the teams come out of the tunnel and outside the stadium behind the South Stand there is a statue of former FA Cup winning manager Bob Stoker, as well as some reminders of the Colliery, as also outside one corner of the stadium is a large miners lamp.

For away fans The Albion pub on Victor Street is 17 minutes away from the ground and a 14-minute walk from either St Peters or Stadium of Light metro stops, is a small pub the size of a house They serve food from there set menus the food has had here has been nice and

drinks are not bad prices. They have pool tables and darts and show all the football matches on big screens so if you want a quiet drink I would stay away on match days as it gets packed out with supporters.



Ground Guide

The Club moved to the Liberty Stadium in 2005, after spending 93 years at their former Vetch Field home. The ground is located near to the former site of the Morfa Athletics Stadium on the West side of the River Tawe which is shared with Ospreys Rugby Union Club. The stadium was named the Liberty Stadium under a 10-year corporate sponsorship deal.



It is completely enclosed with all four corners filled with seating. Each of the four stands is two tiered and three are of the same height. The West Stand at one side of the pitch is slightly taller, having a row of 28 corporate hospitality boxes, situated above the upper tier. The Club's offices are also located behind this stand.

Both ends have an electric scoreboard situated on the front of their roofs, although for some reason the scoreboard at the North End is larger than the one at the South End. Outside the stadium at the South West corner, by the club shop is a statue of former Swansea legend Ivor Allchurch their all-time scorer in their history with 166 goals in 18 seasons.

Away fans are housed in the North Stand at one end of the stadium. Up to 2,000 fans can be accommodated in this area, with the views of the playing action from this area are excellent as there is a good height between rows and the leg room is probably one of the most generous of any stadium that I have visited over the years (1240 and counting).

Driving Directions



Leave the M4 at Junction 45 and take the A4067 towards the City Centre (Signposted A4067 South). Stay on the A4067 for around two and half miles and you will reach the stadium on your left. Car parking at the stadium is for permit holders only and most of the immediate residential areas around the stadium now have 'residents only' parking schemes in place. Do not park on the nearby Retail Park as you will end up with a ticket or be clamped!

So, for the away/neutral supporters use the Park & Ride facility located at the Felindre Steel Works site, this is signposted off Junction 46, shortly after leaving the M4. The cost of parking there including transport by bus to and from the stadium is £6 per car and with dedicated buses 4, 4a, X50 120, 122, 125, 132 and 501 back here you are off home quicker and without a ticket.

The ground is going through a number of changes at the moment, the most significant of which is the redevelopment of the East side of the stadium, with a new stand which will hold 2,600 fans demolishing two old stands on that side plus open terracing and the new stand

will look like Torquay United new stand.



Graham Taylor Stand

Opposite to where the new stand is being built is the Graham Taylor Stand. This stand is named after their most famous manager and was opened in 1986. It is a two-tiered stand that has an interesting roof design; with a number of semi-circular arches like at the old Main Road in Manchester and it also has a row of executive boxes running across the back.



Rookery Stand

The ground has had both ends re-developed during the 1990's along with the front of the Graham Taylor stand. Both ends are similar looking large single tiered stands, with away fans are housed in one of these ends in the Vicarage Road Stand up to 3,000 depending on support.



Vicarage Road End

Opposite the Rookery Road Stand is larger, housing some 6,950 supporters. With construction of a large office block immediately behind the stadium, beyond the corner between the Rookery Stand and the Rous Stand, the Club embarked on internally 'filling in' this corner. However due to financial difficulties, the work has never completed leaving a somewhat ugly half-finished shell.



East Stand (Sir Elton John Stand)

The new East part of the ground has been redeveloped; the teams still emerge from some temporary dressing rooms on that side. The teams come out to the old theme tune of the old Police series Z-Cars from the 1960's and 70's like Everton.

Leave the M1 at Junction 5 and take the A4008 Stephenson Way into Watford. At Waterfield Roundabout take the second exit onto the A411 just past the Premier Inn and follow the signs for Watford General Hospital then follow the road into Breechen Grove. Continue down the road till you see the sign for Vicarage Road Girls School/ Watford General Hospital and take a left down Vicarage Road then at the bottom of the road take a left and get in the right-hand lane and follow the road round and then get in the left lane and at the lights turn left into Vicarage Road and follow it down to the ground.

There are also some private match day car parks available at some industrial units near the ground, as well as the Vicarage Road Girls School in Vicarage Road, which is 5 minutes' walk down the lane to the stadium and charges £7 per car.

From the M25 get of a Junction 18 then turn right onto the A404 and follow it to the Rickmansworth roundabout then take the first exit onto the A412 Park Road go straight on at the first roundabout then take the third exit into Ascot Road at the second roundabout then after a few yards at the next roundabout take the second exit into Whippendell Road then at the lights take a right into Hagden Road then go on at one roundabout then at the crossroads take a left into Vicarage Road the ground is on the right after about 200yards.

Ground Guide

The club took over 30 years to convert the old ground into the Modern and they started with the Halfords Lane Stand. This stand which was opened in 1982 which stretches around two corners of the ground with the home end Birmingham Road Stand which is a large, covered, and quite steep and at the opposite end is for the away fans where around 3,000 are accommodated which are housed in the Smethwick End with both these ends were built and completed in 1995.



The East Stand is an impressive, large single tiered stand which completed the building programme in 2001, which has been well integrated with the rest of the ground. It has a row of executive boxes running along the back, and to each side of the stand the previous open corners have been filled with corrugated sheeting. There is a thin supporting pillar on each side of the stand to support the corner structures.



In between the East Stand & Birmingham Road End you will notice perched up on a wall, a large Throstle (the club's emblem) standing on a football. This has been kept over from the previous stand it used to sit above the clock on the half time scoreboard and maintains the links with tradition.



Birmingham Road Stand

Outside the ground on the same corner are the Jeff Astle Memorial Gates who played for the club between 1964 to 1974 and scored 174 goals the club erected them in tribute to the legendary striker and watch they don't close them or you will need a tom tom to find your way back to either Rolfe or Hawthorns Stations. Whilst just beyond the East Stand Car Park is a Memorial Garden and look out for the West Brom Mascot called 'Baggie Bird', who does a good job of entertaining the away fans before the game.
